Course Description: English 1302 involves the intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for development research-based expository and persuasive texts. Emphases are on the effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical reading of verbal, visual, and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions.

Prerequisite: An earned grade of "C" or better in English 1301.

Course requirements:

- 1. Journal Assignments Five journals will be assigned to enhance understanding of the course curriculum.
- 2. Visual Argument Presentation A brief presentation will be given the second week of class focusing on analyzing a visual argument.
- 3. Essays Two essays will be assigned during the course of the semester focusing on analyzing and constructing argumentative writing.
- 4. Research Project One researched essay will be assigned utilizing the APA paper format. Topics will be discussed and assigned during class.

5. Peer Reviews – Four peer review assignments will be competed. This aspect of the writing process will utilize different techniques, which will be discussed in class.
