• I recommend downloading the Brightspace D2L App and/or the Outlook app (set up with your COM e-mail) so you can keep up with class announcements.

Course Description: This course covers the origin and development of the Texas Constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and inter-governmental relations, political participation, the election process, public policy, and the political culture of Texas.

Remember that this is a **self-paced** online course.

You are expected to be keeping up with reading, lectures, notes, and turning in assignments weekly. Keep this in mind before the semester drop deadline, <u>April 22nd</u>, <u>2024</u>.

Each week, I recommend listening to the lecture and looking at the corresponding notes, and then skimming the chapter. Students who do that generally do well in the course.

- This is an online class, but I know lectures can sometimes be helpful. I post recorded lectures for most chapters we cover; I highly encourage listening to those. I recommend listening to the lecture and looking at the corresponding notes and skimming the provided chapter. Some students fill out their study guide as they listen to the lectures, some students take their own notes, some just listen- whatever works for you. Students who listen to the lectures, skim the chapters, and look at the notes do well on the exams and assignments.
- I don't grade assignments via email! So please be sure you submit your work on D2L.

- I don't do make-ups/ re-grade assignments. If you don't follow the instructions for an assignment and it gets a 0 or miss a participation assignment and get a 0, that grade is final- but I do offer extra credit to make up points.
- You are expected to write your assignments in your own words- assignments that are obviously generated by AI (includes

tools like ChatGPT and Bing and other similar things, as well paraphrasing generators/translators) **Will**receive no credit. After one 0, I <u>will</u> submit an academic

dishonesty report to the College. *Please* don't do that!

Syllabus Quiz (5 points)

Students will take a brief quiz on D2L to demonstrate they are familiar with the class policies and have read the syllabus. It is 10 questions, and it should not take long to complete.

The syllabus quiz needs to be taken on time; I will not reopen it.

Syllabus Quiz due Sunday January 22nd by 11:59pm!

Exams (2 x15 points)

2 exams will be given throughout the semester. They will be multiple-choice questions with 5 short answer questions. I usually add 2-4 extra credit short answer questions. You will take the exam on D2L with Lockdown Browser anytime during the day they are assigned. The tests will be worth 15 points each.

They will encompass only material presented from the last examination. The exams will **not** be cumulative.

The exams will be taken with Lockdown Browser! Please be sure you are prepared to do that with a suitable connection, computer, and camera before the exams close.

You will not be able to use any materials to take the tests. Referencing a study guide, notes, books, phone, or written material while taking the exam will result in a 0 for cheating. However, to help you prepare for the exams-study guides will be provided on D2L

- Exam 1 will be available Feb 16- Feb 20th. Exam 1 will close Feb 20th at 11:59pm.
- Exam 2 will be available May 7th-May 10th. Exam 2 will close May 10th at 11:59pm.

Participation Activities (10 x 3 points)

Up to 30 points will be awarded for class participation and response to 10 prompts. These weekly writings should reflect an understanding of the material and demonstrate that the student has read the notes/skimmed the chapter/listened to the lecture as well as conducted additional research, if applicable.

Participation activities will be <u>due on Sunday evenings</u> throughout the course beginning January 22nd, and worth 3 points each (towards 30 total participation points). These assignments will close after 11:59pm the day after they are due (so at Monday nights at 11:59pm) and I will not accept them late after that. However, I will offer optional extra credit periodically to earn back some lost points if a week's activity is missed.

Participation activities are found on D2L in the weekly folders under Content. Please follow the instructions for submission. Each activity will have different requirements as to accepted length.

<u>Topic Assignment and Position Paper (30 points total, 10 for topic assignment, 20 for position paper)</u>

Students will complete a topic assignment and write a position paper on one of the following public policy controversies in Texas:

- Should marijuana be legalized in Texas?
- Should capital punishment be abolished in Texas?
- Should the criminal justice system in Texas be reformed?
- Should the Texas legislature be altered?
- Should the funding apparatus of Texas K-12 schools be changed?
- Should education be voluntary for children in Texas?

Topic Assignment (10 points) DUE: Feb 12th, 2023 at 11:59pm on D2L

To ensure that students will be successful for the position paper, they will first complete a topic assignment. Students will fill out the topic assignment worksheet to submit their chosen topic and at least THREE sources (on works cited in MLA, APA, or Chicago style) with a brief explanation on which topic they have chosen, which side they intend to take. There is a worksheet on D2L that has every component you need for the topic assignment. It will be graded with comments, use these comments for the paper.

Position Paper (20 points) Due April 18th at 11:59pm on D2L

Write a paper taking a position (yes or no) on your chosen issue. Conduct research on the topic, citing at least <u>FOUR</u> sources (adding at least 1 from the topic assignment) from credible and reliable publications, web sites, journals, books, etc.

Formulate an argument based on evidence in defense of this position and respond to the objections to this position. Explain how this position impacts the issues of personal responsibility and social responsibility.

The paper should be 1000 words (approximately 4 pages), double-spaced, with 1-inch margins, and a 12-point Times New Roman Font, with a works cited page with correctly formatted MLA, APA, or Chicago style citations. There should be a works cited (not included in word count) and in-text citations throughout the paper.

Please use the template provided on D2L with the correct formatting and header. Paper Guidelines:

Format

- o **Template on D2L**, citation style on the works cited page can be MLA, APA, or Chicago (as long as it is consistent)
- Times New Roman
- o 12 Point font
- o Correct header from the template that does not take up half the page.
- o Double-spaced
- o 1-inch margins
- No end notes
- Microsoft Word doc or PDF file
- 1000 words (aim for 4 pages) not including the works cited page
- Be sure to cite both paraphrased and quoted information. Do not use more than two direct quotes.
- You can use the following sources for topic assignment and paper:
 - o Academic journal articles from library databases
 - O Newspaper articles (not from editorial section) preferably from print media (like *The Houston Chronicle, The Austin American Statesman, Texas Monthly, Texas Tribune, The Economist, The Washington Post*, etc. As far as non-print journalism goes local news is usually acceptable, and NPR, AP, Reuters, C-Span, CBS News, and ABC News generally have decent reporting)
 - o Government sites (the Texas government websites are regularly updated and maintained)
 - o Research and polling institutes like Pew

• You may **NOT** use the following sources:

- Wikipedia (good starting point to read about your topic, just go to the sources that it links)
- o Pro-Con.org
- o Editorials
- o Blogs (including posts on Medium, Thought Catalog, etc)

- o Random lawyers' websites
- Avoid the lower tier news publications. This means NO Huffington Post, the Federalist, New York Post, CNN, Buzzfeed, The Daily Beast, Daily Mail, MSNBC, Fox News, OAN, The Blaze, Epoch Times, InfoWars, Occupy Democrats, Breitbart, Drudge Report, etc. etc.
- o Avoid interest group websites (e.g. ACLU, Planned Parenthood, NRA, etc) as they have an agenda in providing information.
- O You may **not** use papers you wrote in other classes.

Current Event Paper (5 points)

Students will find a news article about a topic relevant to the class material on Texas or local government from a reputable news source (such as *Texas Monthly, the Houston Chronicle, Texas Tribune*, or other newspaper) and read it and consider how it applies to concepts they have learned in the course. The article should also be recent (within a month of the due date of the paper). The article must focus on news that is pertinent to Texas or local governments actions and/or the interaction between the state or local government and people.

For the paper, students will submit a 1-2 (at least 1 full page) page analysis of the article.

Your paper should be a brief summary and then an analysis of the article you have chosen. Analysis within the context of political science means that you are putting an action or a topic in the broader scope of Texas government and of its interaction with citizens. You will relate the article to what you have learned in class. For instance, if you pick an article about an upcoming execution you will relate it to what we learned about the criminal justice system, if you pick an article about something the Texas governor is doing you will relate to what you learned about the powers of the governor, etc etc.

Please provide in-text citations when you are summarizing the article and a properly composed citation (MLA or APA is acceptable) of the article. There should be in-text citations as well as a works cited entry for your article at the end of the paper.

For formatting, there is also a template provided. Please use the correct formatting that is already on the template, meaning the paper should not have a huge header to make it seem longer.

Opportunities to earn extra credit will include sporadic written assignments, exam questions, and possible events outside of class.
