Course Description:

Anatomy and Physiology I is the first part of a two-course sequence. It is a study of the structure and function of the human body including cells, tissues, and organs of the following systems: integumentary, skeletal, muscular, nervous, and special senses. Emphasis is on interrelationships among systems and regulation of physiological functions involved in maintaining homeostasis. Prerequisite: TSIA2 945-990 ELAR/CRC test AND 5 or higher on Essay OR 910-944 on CRC with 5-6 on Diagnostic Test + 5 or higher on Essay, or IRW 0320 with a grade of "C" or better. BIOL 1408 with a grade "C" or better is strongly recommended as a prerequisite but is not required.

Course requirements:

Lecture Exams & Final Exam

All Exams will be taken during class and will consist of the following format. Short-answer, essay, matching, multiple choice, and T/F. Scantron and #2 pencil will be required for the exam. Exams will be taken in the first part of class only so it is important that you arrive on time and work efficiently on the exam. In order to prepare you for the Final Exam which will have a cumulative part of the exam, each successive test in the course will contain material from the previous test to help with retention of material as a bonus section.

Quizzes

You will have **four quizzes** that are found in D2L Brightspace in either the Quizzes location in the Navigation Course Menu Bar or with links embedded in the corresponding unit. You will have 40 minutes to answer these questions. You also have two attempts on this quiz where your grade will be determined by the best score from the two. If you experience technical difficulty, please contact me. If I can verify the technical difficulty, I can reset quiz if the due date has not passed. I advise you to try and take the quiz earlier in the week vs. the last hour on the Due date! Quiz due dates are listed in the schedule.

Lecture Assignments

These assignments are found in the Mastering A&P unit in D2L Brightspace, where you will have to enter the Mastering Course Home link to see the list of Mastering A&P assignments. These assignments are designed specifically to help you learn and think critically about the lecture material. You have two attempts on these assignments where the best score is kept as your grade.

Multiple Posts in Discussion Forums

You will have two required discussion forums where you are going to have to make an initial post to the discussion forum in D2L Brightspace. Links will be provided in the Lecture Material Content area. The initial post will have specific criteria that you must research and form an opinion regarding the topic. You will also have to make a second post to another student's post to extend the discussion further in a **positive** manner. It is important to recognize if the wrong information is being posted, but please be respectful of others when notifying a person of misinforming information.

Case Study Group Assignments

You will have two case study group assignments that will be carried out in-class and out of class. It will consist of research and writing a well composed report.

Lab Practicals

There will be 3 laboratory practicals. These exams consist of in-class Power Point presentations. The practicals are timed so if a student comes late, he/she risks not being able to complete or even take this test.

Lab Science Policy

This course consists of both a lecture and laboratory grade component. Students must earn a 70% or better in the laboratory component to successfully pass the course. Earning less than 70% in the laboratory component will result in an F for the course regardless of the lecture grade. Passing the laboratory component and failing the lecture component will not guarantee a passing grade for the course. Deviations from this policy will be at the sole discretion of the instructor.

Make-Up Policy:

LECTURE EXAMS: Make-ups may be allowed at the discretion of the instructor and/or the presentation of documented excuse that is approved by me for the reason for which a student will miss the class date. The Final Exam score can be used to replace lowest test score and is also an option to the student with an excused absence.

QUIZZES: All quizzes are taken on-line so only if there is proof of extenuating circumstances that prevent the taking of the quiz over the period of time that the quiz is available, the instructor may use the percentage of the upcoming lecture exam to calculate the quiz grade.

DISCUSSION FORUMS & LECTURE ASSIGNMENTS: Only if there is proof of extenuating circumstances that prevent the assignments from being completed over the period of time that these assignments are available, the instructor may allow the make up of these assignments.

CASE STUDY GROUP ASSIGNMENT: Students will pair up to complete a case study and write up their research in one report. There is no extension of the due dates unless you have a documented excuse approved by me.

LAB ASSIGNMENTS: Unexcused absences on lab class days will result in a zero on the lab assignment for that day. In the case of an excused absence, you will need a documented excuse for missing a lab class approved by me, the percentage earned from the upcoming lab practical grade will be used to calculate assignment score.

LAB PRACTICALS: Make-up practicals will only be allowed at the discretion of the instructor with the presentation of a documented excuse.

EXTRA CREDIT: There are no Extra Credit assignments given in this course, but bonus point activities may be assigned along with other assignments. Bonus Point activities cannot be made up!

Attendance Policy:
