Course Description: This course is required for music majors. Advanced harmony voice leading, score analysis and writing of more advanced tonal harmony including chromaticism and extended-tertian structures. Optional correlated study at the keyboard. Concurrent enrollment in MUSI 2117 is required. Prerequisite: MUSI 2311 with a grade of "C" or better.

Course Requirements: Students must purchase a textbook. Students are required to do all assignments assigned in the textbook or given as a handout and required to take all tests. Failure to attend class on the day a quiz is given may forfeit the opportunity to take that test unless you have contacted me prior to class about your absence for that day.

Determination of Course Grade/Detailed Grading Formula (methods of evaluation to be employed to include a variety of means to evaluate student performance): The student must complete assignments as they are given online, in the text, and in the workbook. Tests will be taken at the end of each chapter or as often as the instructor feels they are needed. A mid-term and final exam may be given as well as ongoing quizzes. All points on homework, pop quiz, and exams are weighted the same and the following percentage is used to determine the grade. The instructor reserves the right to make alternate formulas and materials available for students who want to do more work online.

Grading on all tests use the following percentages

90% accuracy = A

80 % accuracy = B

70 % accuracy = C

60 % accuracy = D

Grading Scale:
