Course Description: ENGL 1301. COMPOSITION I (LECTURE 3, LAB 0). CREDIT 3. AGCM. Intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essays as a vehicle for learning, communicating and critical analysis. Prerequisites: One of the following TSI scores combinations or equivalent developmental courses (1) TSI Reading 351 and TSI Writing 350 and TSI Essay 5 (2) TSI Reading 351 with TSI Writing 363 and Essay 4 (3) TSI Reading 351 and TSI Writing less than 350 with ABE 4 and TSI Essay 5.

Course requirements: Online students are 100% responsible for reading and viewing course content, and assignment instructions, and for submitting assignments by the designated due date and time. It is imperative that you start early each week, log into D2L/Brightspace daily, and watch for daily announcements and/or emails. *You must have access to a working computer and a reliable Internet connection to successfully complete this course. If you have technical issues, then I recommend using the library/tutoring center computers at COM or your local library. Personal computer and Internet issues are not an acceptable excuse for late/incomplete work in this course. This course is collaborative, and you are expected to participate in online and class discussions, activities, and peer-review. You will be expected use resources within D2L/Brightspace to support your writing projects, take quizzes, participate in discussions and peer-review, conduct research using COM's library (if available), utilize COM Tutoring Center

(writing tutors), write and submit three major papers, and properly document your sources in the MLA documentation style.

Originality Requirement: All writing for this course must be original to this class for this semester. All major written assignments to Turnitin through assigned D2L/Brightspace dropboxes.

Late Work, Make-Up, and Extra-Credit Policy: Late work and make-ups will only be allowed without penalty with properly documented excuses, but the instructor must be notified by email right away. There will be hidden extra credit bonuses which you may earn throughout the semester provided you read your assigned course materials and listen to the recorded lectures carefully. All papers are due at 5:00pm on the date assigned in our course calendar. For every day a paper assignment is late, the instructor will deduct 10 points; after five days, all late papers will receive a zero. Papers not submitted to their corresponding dropboxes in D2L/Brightspace before the due date are considered a day late. Technology problems are not valid excuses for missing weekly work nor major written assignments.

Attendance Policy: Students are considered present for the week by completing the weekly quizzes assigned to each module. These quizzes test your knowledge of the lecture, readings, supplemental videos, and/or assigned films for the week. They are not extremely difficult, but neglecting to complete all activities assigned to each week will result in poor quiz grades which will greatly affect your class participation & weekly work grade. Other absences I excuse, with proper documentation, in addition to what College of Mainland allows are the following:

- Serious illness
- Serious illness, or death, of an immediate family member
- EMS, fire department, police, or other public service duties or training
- Legal matters

Peer-Review: I have setup peer-review discussion boards for each major written assignment which you will be required to participate in in D2L/Brightspace. These will open progressively when we approach the respective due dates for each assignment. Peer-review is mandatory, and failure to participate in the allotted time will result in a 10-point deduction from the final grade of each major written assignment.

Redemption Policy: If a student fails a paper for not meeting minimal requirements for the paper, the student may opt to redeem the failed assignment with corrections. However, the student must qualify to redeem zero by meeting the minimal requirements for the two remaining papers. If the student satisfactorily meets this criterion, the instructor will allow the student to resubmit the failed assignment with corrections for a grade (this means you may start with your originally submitted draft). Failing two major assignments disqualifies the student from redeeming a failed grade.

Communicating with your instructor: ALL electronic communication with the instructor must be through your COM email. Due to FERPA restrictions, faculty cannot share any information about performance in the class through other electronic means. Email is available Monday-Friday. I check and answer emails throughout the day, but I do not answer emails after 5:00pm, on weekends, or holiday breaks. Never wait until the last minute to contact me with questions regarding assignments. If you email me on late Friday evening, I will not read your email until the following Monday. I utilize the announcements feature in D2L/Brightspace to make important class announcements relevant to the entire class. Additionally, I have a discussion created in D2L/Brightspace wherein students may post questions about the course, and I will respond. I also hold digital office hours twice a week.
