**IRW 0320 Catalog Description:** This course is a co-requisite class for English Composition 1301. This course carries institutional credit and may not be used to meet degree requirements. Placement: (1) TSI Essay—score 2 or 3 with TSI Writing multiple choice score of 340–349 or (2) TSI Reading–score of 342–350 or (3) Successful completion ("C" or better) of Read 0340 or ENGL 0330 prior to 8/31/2014 or (4) Successful completion ("C" or better of IRW 0300). This course does not transfer

**Required Materials:** There is no required text for this course. All materials related to the grammar concept packets/quizzes/etc. are created by me and will be provided to you in printed form. The only materials that you will be required to bring to class daily are the following:

- Pencil/pen
- Materials from previous weeks (I recommend that you keep a folder specifically for IRW and a folder for ENGL 1301)
- If you use a personal laptop, I highly recommend you bring and use it in class instead of the classroom computers; this can ensure that you are learning how to complete assignments on the computer you will be using at home.

#### **Course Requirements:**

**Attendance:** Because this course is aimed to help you be successful in ENGL 1301, your attendance and participation in this course is crucial. Participation involves attending as many classes as you can and using class time wisely to complete daily checklists and grammar concepts. Other activities might include in-class discussions or conferences related to your work in ENGL 1301.

#### Grammar Practice WS/Packets | Wednesday (start of class)

This semester we will be discussing and practicing five different grammar concepts. You will be required to complete a grammar concept packet for each one by Thursday on the week the concept was introduced. The purpose of the packet is to prepare you for the grammar concept quiz the following week. You may not take the quiz until you have completed the practice packet for that grammar concept.

#### Grammar Concept Quizzes | Mondays

Each Tuesday, you will take a grammar concept quiz that covers the material that we learned from the previous week. If you are absent on a quiz day, you will need to make it up the following class day that you are present.

**ENGL 1301 Effort:** You will receive a weekly grade out of 10 points that will be based on the following:

- Attendance in ENGL 1301 (2/10)
- ENGL 1301 weekly assignment submitted for that week (4/10)
- ENGL 1301 HW/in-class activities completed on time (2/10)
- Staying on task overall, especially in regard to daily checklists (1/10)
- ENGL 1301 extra credit post submitted by Sunday (1/10)

#### Grammar Concept Teaching Demo | Week 8

Though the goal is to understand all grammar concepts, you will be tasked at mastering one. Toward the end of the semester – as we review what we have learned – you will be required to review a grammar concept with the class. This will include recapping the grammar concept and going over the answers to the final review that corresponds with your assigned grammar concept. More details will be given toward the end of the semester.

#### Grammar Concept Final Review/Exam | Week 8

This is related to the Grammar Concept Teaching Demos and your attendance and attention to them during Week 8.

#### Book Critique Presentation | Week 8 (in class)

Though refining your writing is important in addition to staying on top of your ENGL 1301 stuff, it is also helpful to think about who you are as a reader (what you enjoy reading and why). Your independent reading of a chosen book will culminate into a book presentation in the final week of class. More details will come toward the end of the course.

You may turn in your grammar practice + take the quiz on the next class day for full credit if you are absent.

**Extra Credit Opportunities:** There is no extra credit offered in this course.

Attendance Policy: Attendance is required to be successful in the class. I understand things come up. Please communicate with me if you need to miss and I will work with you to get caught up on anything you might miss. Per COM policy, no absences are considered excused unless for religious or military service reasons. Please do not ask to leave class early unless for a documented emergency.
