There is no access code required for this course. All required course materials will be available in the textbook itself and online on Brightspace D2L (Desire to Learn). The Java source files listed in the textbook are posted in D2L. This is the same book used for Programming Fundamentals II.

Course Description:

Further applications of programming techniques, introducing the fundamental concepts of data structures and algorithms. Topics include data structures (including stacks, queues, linked lists, hash tables, trees, and graphs), searching, sorting, recursion, and algorithmic analysis. Programs will be implemented in the Java Programming Language. This course is included in the Associate of Science Degree for Computer Science, and is considered a Capstone course. It is also included in COM's Programming Certificate. COSC 1437, Programming Fundamentals II, is a prerequisite.

Course Requirements:

Programming Fundamentals III consists of lectures delivered in the classroom and hands-on exercises, worked by the students in the classroom. Each student has access to a COM personal computer in the classroom. These computers have the necessary software installed for working the hands-on exercises.

Students are also required to complete assignments outside of class. Success in programming depends on a lot of practice. It is inevitable that writing code will involve a good deal of debugging. It is an important part of learning how to program. Even though learning programming takes time, it is fun and satisfying to get programs to work properly.



You will need the Java Development Kit (JDK) Version 8 and the NetBeans Integrated Development Environment on your own computer. Both are free of charge. These are the same tools used for Programming II, COSC 1437 or COSC 1337. Be sure you have the JDK Version 8, not a later version. Later versions do not work correctly with the graphics assignments. As a Capstone Course, this course will culminate in a Capstone project, which encompasses multiple concepts from various chapters in the text.
