Required Textbook/Materials: Society in Focus: An Introduction to Sociology, 9th edition. Written by W.E. Thompson, J.V. Hickey, and M.L. Thompson

Course Description: Introduction to the scientific study of human society, including ways in which groups, social institutions, and individuals affect each other. Causes of social stability and social change are explored through the application of various theoretical perspectives, key concepts, and related research methods of sociology. Analysis of social issues in their institutional context may include topics such as social stratification, gender, race/ethnicity, and deviance.

The course is set up in Blackboard (Bb). The student will have the ability to communicate with the course professor and classmates using Bb; all course material/information and assessments are located in Bb.

Classroom Etiquette and Requirements

Conversation/Discussion in Classroom (online and on-campus): This course covers topics that some deem sensitive and controversial. Students will hear ideas that may differ from their own. That is okay! That is good. Learning to hear difference, learning to engage with others that are different from you is skill that you want to develop. When we can listen, engage in scholarly conversation and debate and walk away with a better understanding of the "other" – we are a better people for it! This is a skill that is developed, it does not come naturally. Learn now – it will help you in your professional and personal relationships as well and interactions with those that you do not know. Past, current events are indicative that this skill is much needed! Be quick to listen, don't speak over one another or the course professor. Each person will have an opportunity to express their understanding of the topic and their experiences – these are valued!

Late Work, Make-Up, and Extra-Credit Policy

Attendance Policy/Extra Credit: Attendance will be taken at each week via an online discussion forum. The purpose is to encourage students to engage in course reading and completion of course assessments each week and discuss findings/observations.

• Be prepared to participate in online discussion forums located under the "Weekly Participation/Attendance" link. These are discussion forums on weekly "current or social events." This is an opportunity for you to share your opinion, share a little about you (at your comfort level) as it relates to what is occurring in our society and as it relates to the course – and there is SO MUCH! If you are looking to earn extra credit in the course, this is how you do it! There is not an extra credit assignment at the end of the course! Earn extra credit points all throughout the course, don't wait until the last minute!

Late Work/Make-Up Work: Students are encouraged to complete assigned work each week. This course offers much flexibility, but has identified due dates/deadlines for each unit. Assessments must be submitted by the due date/deadline and will not be accepted late. If you miss a due date/deadline, take advantage of extra credit offered within each unit! If there is a medical emergence that prevents you from submitting coursework, contact the course professor BEFORE the due date/deadline. The course professor WILL WORK with you – if you contact the course professor BEFORE the due date/deadline.

Communicating with your instructor: ALL electronic communication with the course professor must be through a student's COM email and/or Blackboard. Due to FERPA restrictions, faculty cannot share any information about performance in the class through other electronic means. (Faculty may add additional statement requiring monitoring and communication expectations via Blackboard or other LMS).

(1) Orientation

- 3 required assessments: Introduction Discussion Forum; Syllabus/Contract Quiz; email communication
- 3 optional/extra credit assignments: What do you know; Start the Conversation Discussion Forum; Student Survey

(2) Assignments

Discussion Forums

- Personal Reflections where the student uses terms to make connections from the course material to their experiences and events occurring in the world around them.
- Two posts are required to earn points. Be genuine, be polite, be sincere, and engage in conversation!
 - o Post 1: Reply to the question/statement made by the course professor. Use the required term(s) in your post. Write in complete sentences using correct grammar and spelling. End your post with a question that relates to the topic/or your post. Follow the word/sentence requirement listed in Bb. Use the assigned textbook, do not use any other source
 - O Post 2: Reply to a post made by a classmate. Begin your response with the classmate's name. Write in complete sentences using correct grammar and spelling. Adhere to the word/sentence requirement. Do not write good job or similar language. The goal is to simulate conversation that would take place in the classroom. You are writing what you would say if we were in class (on-campus) discussing the topic with your classmates. Make it a conversation! Adhere/follow to the word/sentence requirement listed in Bb.

Video/Article Quizzes

Assesses the student's understanding of an event. Short quiz or a video or article. Students have
two attempts! If a student attempts a quiz a second time, the student's final score will be the points
earned on the second attempt. Do not attempt a quiz a second time if one is satisfied with one's
initial score. Do not click on the quiz a second time if one is attempting to see points earned or
questions missed.

(3) Quizzes – What Did you Learn (Post Topic Quizzes)

• When a student completes the assigned reading and completes the offered assignments, the student has the opportunity to assess their knowledge of the material by taking a <u>non-timed</u> quiz for each topic/chapter. The student will have two (2) opportunities to complete each topic/chapter quiz. If a student attempts a quiz a second time, the student's final score will be the points earned on the second attempt. Do not attempt a quiz a second time if one is satisfied with one's initial score. Do not click on the quiz a second time if one is attempting to see points earned or questions missed. Look for one's score under My Student Grades link or request a time to meet with the course professor to discuss missed questions and score. There are no unit exams; there is no mid-term exam; there is no final exam!

(4) *Chapter Study Guides ... Focus Questions, Key Terms, Applying sociology

• A study guide (SG) is offered for each topic. For the required study guides (T1, T5, T9), students are asked to define ter.ms, answer questions over the assigned chapter, and write a short essay applying sociological theory For the optional/extra credit study guides, students are asked to define terms, answer questions over the assigned chapter (no short essay).

The purpose of the study guides is to encourage the student to read chapters in the assigned textbook so that they can engage in conversation, excel on the quizzes and write a quality paper (Final Writing Assignment). Once completed, upload each study guide to the indicated link in Bb. Look for the Study Guide folder under each topic folder. To earn points/credit for a study guide, all indicated terms/questions must be answered. Partial work will not earn points or credit towards requirements for a student's final letter grade

- o Required: Submit 3 study guides submit SG marked required in Bb
- Optional: Submit study guides marked as optional/extra credit (9)
- O Answers to the questions and definitions to the terms are found in the required textbook, Society in Focus: An Introduction to Sociology, 9th edition. ONLY use the Thompson, Hickey, Thompson for this assessment do not use any other source.
- (5) **Final Writing Assignment:** This assessment offers the student the opportunity to utilize a beginner's mind, discuss and apply sociological theory, as well as make connections to a historical event. This assessment is required for those students seeking to earn an A in SOCI 1301. Review the Final Writing Assignment link in Bb for instructions, requirements, helpful tips to succeed, and evaluation criteria.
