Course Description: Origin and development of the Texas constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and inter-governmental relations, political participation, the election process, public policy and the political culture of Texas.

Course Requirements:

Discussion Board Threads:

From the first module of the course up to and including Module 14, you will have a discussion board thread to participate in. Your participation in these threads is graded, so it is important to make an honest effort to constructively participate in online discussion. The questions posed to you are designed to demonstrate contemporary relevance of course material. In other words, I want to show you how this material in this course applies to the “real world” through discussion and dialogue.

Each discussion board thread is worth 20 points. Your initial discussion board post must be, at minimum, 200 words in length and directly address the question posed for that week’s thread. Then, students are required to submit two response posts, each responding to another student’s initial post. Each of these two response posts are to be, at minimum, 75 words in length and address something contained in the student’s post. “Good post” and “I agree” are not adequate response posts. *Please pay attention to deadlines for initial posts and response posts in the course calendar.*

For each discussion board thread, your initial posts are always due each Wednesday of each week, with your two response posts due each Sunday of each week. This is *very* important to remember; not posting initial posts and/or response posts in a timely manner is the number one cause of lost points in this course. To have fruitful discussions on the topics to be covered, we must have different due dates for initial posts and for response posts.

When I grade your discussion board posts, I will issue 10 points (assuming you met expectations) for your effort, so you know you are on the right track with your posts. Then, once you submit your two response posts, if they meet expectations, I will then issue the other 10 points (five points for each response post). You will find that I grade assignments on the day they are submitted; it is important to me that students know where they stand in the course at any given time. If you submit your initial post and receive 10 points out of 20 points, do not panic! If you submit those two response posts, you will earn the remaining 10 points.

Remember – because we are covering two modules per week, this means you will be completing two discussion board threads each week.

Quizzes:

For each module up to and including Module 14, students will be required to complete a quiz that covers the chapter for that week. Each quiz consists of 20 questions, one point for each question, and are either multiple-choice or true/false. The quiz questions are directly based on the material in each of the chapters of the textbook and the quizzes are open book. You will have 30 minutes to complete each quiz.

Remember – because we are covering two modules per week, this means you will be completing two quizzes each week.

Essay Tests:

As previously indicated, you will be required to complete four essay tests at various points during the course. The course schedule outlines when they will be due. Each test will consist of ten questions, each requiring an itemized list, the defining of a term or a short answer, typically not to exceed a 5-6 sentence paragraph. Each essay test will also include an extra credit question for an opportunity for you to earn additional points toward your overall final grade.

Article Report:

For Module 14, you will be required to submit to me an article report. For this report, you are to pick an article from a news periodical or scholarly journal that pertains to a topic, theory, or issue related to the course (meaning, pertains to an issue related to American government and politics). You are then to read it and submit to me a report on this article. The report should include a summary of the article, as well as your assessment, interpretations, and analysis of the information contained in the article. News journals such as Time, Newsweek, and US News and World Report are acceptable. Countless articles contained in scholarly journals are available in the EBSCO and JSTOR databases accessible through the Dallas College Virtual Library. This report should be three pages in length (minimum), double-spaced, using 12-point font, and make sure you provide a citation for the article used on a separate page. **Newspaper articles are NOT acceptable.**

Position Paper Assignment:

For this assignment, you are to write a position paper on a specific controversy in the current public policy discourse and debate in the State of Texas. What is meant by a position paper is to take a stance on the issue of your choice and defend that stance with facts and information. You may take any position on the issue of your choice; all I ask is that you defend this position. *As is always the case in my class, you will never be graded, judged, or assessed on your opinions and positions.*

The paper is to be 1000 words in length (roughly five pages), using 12-point font, double-spaced with one-inch margins, and utilizing the Chicago Style of Writing. Footnotes and bibliography must reflect this style.

Please choose an issue and find a specific policy or proposed policy related to that issue. Some examples are as follows:

Should the Texas abortion law be repealed?

Should marijuana be legalized in Texas?

Does Texas have the power to prevent illegal migrants from crossing the border?

Is the use of capital punishment by Texas appropriate and legitimate?

Should Texas offer tuition-free community college for its residents (similar to what Tennessee offers)?

How should Texas spend rainy day funds?

Should the State of Texas legalize sports gambling?

A reminder - your position paper assignment is due no later than 11:59 pm on Thursday, October 9th. I am unable to accept this assignment late for any reason. Please plan and work ahead on this assignment.

Final Examination:

Your final examination will be open book and consist of 100 multiple choice questions (one point each). You will have two hours to complete the final exam. The final exam will be due no later than **11:59 pm Central Time on Thursday, October 9th, 2025.**
