Course Description: This course will provide an overview of human development, from conception to birth. We will explore how people change over time in small ways and large. We will learn about three major domains of human development (biosocial, cognitive and psychosocial) at each life stage (infancy, toddlerhood, preschool, school-aged, adolescence, early adulthood, middle adulthood and late adulthood). Finally, we will deal with the topic of death and how we cope with the end of life in this society.

Course Requirements Grades are based on points accumulated throughout the semester. A variety of means to evaluate student performance will be used throughout the course. There is the possibility of earning 1000 points from assignments and assessments. You are held accountable for completing all assignments. All directions for assignments must be closely followed. DETERMINATION OF GRADE

Methods of Evaluation/Submissions-

- Use Google Chrome or Mozilla Firefox browser (your work will submit BLANK using other browsers)
- All work must typed using Microsoft software. If you do not have Microsoft products, you can download the programs for FREE at <https://www.com.edu/its/office-365.html>
- All work must be saved/uploaded as a .PDF or .DOC, (especially for a MAC or I cant open it)
- All work must be submitted on D2L and attached to the assignment submission page
 - (except discussion boards where you will type directly into the submission page dialogue box.
- Use double spacing and Arial font size 10 or Times New Roman font size 12.
- Assignments with bulleted and/or numbered items should be a **separate and complete paragraph**
- Each assignment has a minimum word count or page length, but you are free to write as much as you like. If you write the "minimum", you should expect to receive the minimum grade.
- Your responses must be well thought out with details, explanations, examples and exhibit critical thinking. I am looking for you to make a connection between the textbook material and your personal experiences and opinions.

Grading Rubrics: Detailed directions and some rubrics for coursework can be found on D2L within the assignment. Please read the directions very carefully and let me know if you have any questions. If you need clarification, please reach out as soon as possible

- **Quizzes 375 points:** There will be a total of 15 quizzes worth 25 points each. The quizzes are 25 questions in form of multiple choice. You will have 45 minutes to complete the quizzes. You have 2 attempts at the quiz, however, I will only grade the LAST ATTEMPT, not the highest attempt. All quizzes are timed, taken on D2L and must be submitted BEFORE 11:59pm on the deadline date. Once you begin the quiz, you must complete the quiz in one timed session.
- **Opinion Paper 100 points:** You will write a paper based on your personal opinion regarding issues that are prevalent in our society. The given prompts and detailed instructions are posted on D2L
- **Discussion Post 400 points:** You will write 4 discussion posts (100 points each) on the discussion board in D2L.
- **Presentation 125 points:** You will give an oral presentation about a topic discussed in the Opinion Paper. More information is below and on D2L

Make-Up & Late Work: **There will be no make up work or late work accepted.** All assignments are time-stamped in D2L and Email and must be submitted BEFORE 11:59. If you turn your work in at 11:59, D2L will mark it late and you will receive a zero. It has to be BEFORE 11:59. Work submitted after the due date deadline will not be graded. Please allow time for your assignments to upload. If your network server is slow, make sure you allow extra time and do not wait until the last minute to submit assignments. Follow your schedule in your syllabus and do not rely on D2L to tell you when something is due. There are computers available for students to use at COM in the library, tutoring center and computer labs if you need a computer and/or internet access.

OPINION PAPER

Respond to all 10 of the prompts below. There is no “right” answer, but you must give in-depth explanations and details to support your responses. I want you to critically think about BOTH SIDES of the argument and then respond. Submit your paper on D2L before the due date.

Each numbered prompt needs to be a separate paragraph that is at least 200 words at the minimum (2000 word for the entire paper). You must include your word count on your paper.

1. A woman knowingly uses marijuana while she is pregnant for recreational use.
2. Your child has told you repeatedly that they are being bullied at school, but the school tells you that your child is the bully and other parents have complained.
3. Your closest, most trusted relative disciplined your child and left a small bruise on their face.
4. Your 4 year old child asks you what sex is and they tell you that heard that word on TV.
5. A close friend asks if your relationship can include “benefits”, to be sexually intimate with each other.
6. You just witnessed a woman physically abusing a man and he is screaming for you to help him.
7. Research shows the main reason that people file for divorce is due to social media.
8. Your aging parents need full time care, but you cannot afford to move them to a facility or hire someone to take care of them.
9. The government wants to outlaw everyone from owning a gun.
10. The government puts a law into effect that states everyone must be vaccinated or face criminal charges

PRESENTATION

You will conduct your own research from one of the 10 prompts that was listed on the Opinion Paper that you completed earlier in the semester. Your research should look at both sides of the argument/topic and you should report back to the class in an unbiased manner.

The Presentation will help students examine some of the ethical issues within psychology and identify how this impacts our society on the community, state, and national level. Further, this will allow students to examine the importance of being knowledgeable of their own personal biases and/or stereotypes, and how they can be more informed in their future interactions.

On presentation day, you will present your findings to the class and be prepared to answer any questions about your chosen topic.

Your research must include the following.

- An unbiased introduction on the topic
- Data collection in the form of graphs and/or charts
- A discussion that includes both sides of the argument/discussion
 - A discussion from one point of view
 - 2 professional resources that support this point of view
 - 1 friend or relative that supports this point of view
 - A discussion from an opposing point of view
 - 2 professional resource that support the opposing viewpoint
 - 1 friend or relative that support the opposing viewpoint
 - A summary of your research
 - A summary of your own beliefs and opinions
 - Did your opinions change at all after doing your research
 - Did your research lead you to understand opposing viewpoints
 - Where do you think your beliefs stem from
