### **Course Description**

This is an introduction to the field of psychology, dealing with such topics as the scientific method and theories, neuroscience and behavior, perception, consciousness, learning, memory, intelligence, motivation, emotion and stress, personality, psychological disorders, and therapy.

### **Course Requirements**

**Method of Instruction:** This course primarily consists of online lessons and discussions provided by the instructor. Additionally, videos and other supplementary articles may be used to emphasize key issues. The online lessons parallel and reinforce assigned readings; therefore it is essential that students keep up to date with their online work. The online lessons will be open for one week, giving you plenty of time to complete the required materials.

**Coursework Policy:** All coursework will be assigned and opened online on a weekly basis. For this course, weeks begin at **12:00am** on the **MONDAY** of the assigned week and end at 11:59pm on the SUNDAY of the assigned week.

**EXCEPTION:** Due to it being the last week of classes, **Week 5** will be short week. Accommodations have been made and Week 5 assignments will open at 12:01am on SATURDAY of Week 4 and close at 5:00pm on THURSDAY of Week 5.

**Late Work/Make-Up Policy:** There are **NO** make-up quizzes, assignments, discussions or exams! With **NO** exception! I leave them all open for a wide period of time to give you every opportunity to complete them within the required period. The dates and times that the graded materials are available will be clearly visible in Blackboard. The due dates will also be posted on the course schedule.

# **Determination of Course Grade/Detailed Grading Formula**

### **Chapter Quizzes:**

13 quizzes: 1 Syllabus/Contract Quiz worth 50 points and 12 Chapter each worth 25 points. Quizzes will be assigned for each chapter and each quiz will have a total of 10 questions. Chapter Quizzes may include a combination of true/false, multiple choice, and/or matching questions. Chapter quizzes are untimed with 2 attempts. HOWEVER, the second attempt is ONLY for those who experience technical difficulties. If a student attempts a Chapter Quiz a second time, the points earned on the second attempt will count as the student's score. NO exceptions. All students must complete the online quizzes by the scheduled due date. There are **no make-up Quizzes**. Students are offered a significant amount of time to take the quizzes, once the quiz has started it must be completed in that session. The student cannot start and stop the quiz.

#### **Discussion Forum Posts:**

Each student will be required to complete discussion forums during the term. 1 Orientation Discussion Forum, 12 Chapter Discussion Forums and 5 Attendance Discussion Forums. To be eligible for full points, the student is required to post twice to each discussion forum. The first post, the student will answer the related chapter questions and the second will be a response to classmate. Both posts must include information from the chapter and be more than "I like what you said, good job." To earn points, posts are to be meaningful responses. These posts offer students the opportunity to discuss a topic related to the assigned chapter in greater depth and simulate classroom discussion.

Follow the instructions for each discussion forum, answer the questions using complete sentences, correct grammar and use the assigned chapter in the textbook. Discussion Forums are worth 25 points.

**NOTE**: Responses can be deleted at the discretion of the instructor. Responses will only be deleted if the instructor determines them to be aggressive, rude, degrading, etc., and they may be deleted without notice to the student. All such responses will receive a grade of 0 for the deleted thread. Please refer to the syllabus for more information regarding student conduct and expectations.

### **Presentation Posts:**

Each student is required to complete 4 short Presentation Posts. Presentation Posts offer students the opportunity to examine some of the ethical issues within psychology and identify how each impacts society at the community, state and national level. This presentation allows students to acknowledge their personal biases and/or stereotypes, and how they can be more informed regarding their future interactions.

#### **Presentation Post instructions:**

- 1. Review the assigned topic
- 2. Develop and record a 5-7 minute presentation on a topic. Specific instructions will be provided.
- 3. Write a brief summary of your presentation.
- 4. Share each presentation with the course instructor. Specific instructions will be provided via Bb

Presentation Posts are worth **75 points**. Presentations will be evaluated based on Quality of Information and Organization, Quality of Verbal Communication, and Quality of Non-Verbal Communication (worth 100 points). Written summary is worth 50 points. **Presentations must meet the time limit to be graded.** 

#### **Exams:**

4 online exams. Each has 50 questions and is worth 100 points. Exams may include a combination of true/false, multiple choice, matching, and/or short answer questions. Exams are timed (120 minutes). Students have ONE (1) attempt to complete the exam, with no second attempts. Complete each exam by the due date. There are **no make-up exams**. Once the exam has been started it must be completed in one session. Students will not have the opportunity to start and stop an exam.

### **Instructions:**

In this presentation, you will examine one of your favorite discussion topics and strengthen your understanding of it using the Internet.

In order to receive full credit, you must complete the following:

- 1. Choose a discussion topic that we have already covered in the Discussion Forum, and find **three sources** that help strengthen your understanding of it.
- 2. Develop and record (<u>See below for recording instructions</u>) a presentation( <u>5 minute minimum</u>) that includes the following:
  - a. an **introduction** of your topic, including information covered in the text and PowerPoints.
  - b. a description of why you have chosen the topic or what peaked your interest in this topic

- c. a <u>description of what you have learned from the websites</u> you have visited (make sure to cite your sources in APA format\* in your written summary)
- d. a **conclusion** summarizing what you have learned about your topic
- 3. In a word document, write a brief summary (1 page minimum) of your presentation
- 4. On a separate page, make sure to include a list of your references/websites. Please be sure to include the following:
  - i. Your References page must be in APA format\*.
  - ii. Under each reference/website, please provide a brief summary (no more than one paragraph) of the website
- 5. <u>Email</u> your recording to your professor. <u>Students must use their College of the Mainland One Drive Account to upload and email the presentation.</u>
- 6. Lastly, **upload** your completed written summary to the assignment.
  - a. Always be sure to upload assignments by opening the assignment link and going to *Attach File* in the *Assignment Submission* section.

Be sure to turn in all materials by the assigned DUE DATE (posted in your syllabus and in the assignment title).

### **General Instructions**

You must record all of your presentations, however **TWO** must be with **an audience of at least 2 or more people (16yo or older)**.

For the presentation with the audience, you must pan (scan) across the audience to verify you have a minimum of two audience members in attendance. This panning (scanning) of the camera must occur at the beginning of the presentation and the end of the presentation (To make sure no one ran out on you ©).

All presentation posts must be uploaded to a COM One Drive and the link must be sent to your instructor.

- 1. Get a peer to record you doing your presentation using a phone, laptop, or video recording device.
- 2. Import the video to your computer.
- 3. Post to COM One Drive.

- 2. Create an account
- 3. View the tutorial video

- 5. Share link to the professor




- 1. Open Quicktime

#### 1. What do I do if Blackboard is down?




