Course Description: English 1301 is designed as an introduction to college-
level, academic writing. This course teaches the principles and techniques of
written composition, textual analysis of non-fiction prose, and critical thinking.
Activities and assignments include paragraphs, essays, research, and analysis
and discussion of assigned readings.

**Course requirements (including description of any special projects or
assignments):** We will be writing numerous papers with a research paper due
at the end of the course. The student will also be required to complete The
Research Tutorial. The student will be required to pick a single topic and write
4-5 papers on that topic for the remainder of the semester. The student will be
required to write on the topic from different perspectives so the issue of a
specific topic should not be taken lightly. The instructor will help anyone having
trouble choosing a topic. The student will also be required to submit one of
his/her papers for class evaluation. The student papers will be the textbook for
the class and out of these papers will come class discussion topics and guided
instruction.
