Course Description:

Intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing academic essays as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis.

Prerequisites: TSIA2 945-990 ELAR/CRC test AND 5 or higher on Essay OR 910-944 on CRC with 5-6 on Diagnostic Test + 5 or higher on Essay, or IRW 0320 with a grade of "C" or better.

Additional Information and Ground Rules

8-week course. Meets: 01/13/2025 to 03/06/2025 Hybrid course. Open Education Resource (OER) will be our source for readings. I will link them each week, but they are in the syllabus.

I understand we are all carrying around mobile devices, but you are here to learn and participate in class. I fully understand that you may choose to use your own laptop for schoolwork, but you should not be texting, watching movies, etc. in class. You also cannot participate if you are wearing headphones or ear buds. There will be time when we will use them. I will let you know when.
