Course Description:

English 1302 involves the intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for development research-based expository and persuasive texts. Emphases are on the effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical reading of verbal, visual, and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions.

Prerequisite: An earned grade of "C" or better in English 1301. If you have not completed ENGL 1301, please inform me immediately to avoid further problems.

Course requirements:

1. *Course Activities* (15%) – All journals, discussions, revision/editing activities, and quizzes, will be included in this category for class. Keep in mind attendance and preparation is

- mandatory and vital for your academic success (see note on the personal responsibility grade component). Successful submission of all course assignments will be required each week to count for class attendance.
- 2. Article Analysis (20%) Students are required to complete an analysis of an argument conveyed in an article on the selected research topic.
- 3. Research Project and Annotated Bibliography (30%) The research project will focus on the argumentative nature of a cause-and-effect relationship. This project will require the completion of an annotated bibliography. More information on this will be provided in the Course Content on D2L/Brightspace.
- 4. *Literary Argument* (20%) An argumentative essay will be required based on the play *Trifles* by Susan Glaspell.
- 5. Reflection Essay and Presentation (15%) The course will conclude with a reflection paper and presentation. More specifics for this assignment will be provided in the "Week 5" Content Folder.

*** A note on Personal Responsibility***

The personal responsibility grade will be included in the Course Activities grade category and will be assessed at the end of the semester. Students are expected to read and view all required course content materials, utilize the Course Toolbox provided in the Resources folder on D2L/Brightspace, utilize NteTutor and the COM Tutoring Center, carefully read and follow all instructions, and turn in all required assignments by the designated due date and time.

Online students are expected to participate in class discussion posts and provide timely feedback on revision/editing exercises.

Face-to-Face students are expected to arrive on time and be fully prepared to participate in class and in revision/editing exercises.

Make-Up/Late Work Policy:

All assignments are due by 11:59 p.m. on the posted due date. Students are expected to be aware of the due dates and manage their projects accordingly. Assignment sheets for each major project will be provided containing the relevant due dates, assignment criteria, and the grading rubric for transparency of expectations. A grace period of three days after the due date will be provided to account for last-minute issues. A deduction of 10 percentage points will apply to each assignment submitted during this grace period. After this date, students who have not submitted the assignment will receive a grade of "0". Deadlines will only be extended for cases involving military service, religious holidays, or **documented** emergencies.

*** If you are having trouble meeting a deadline for a major assignment, it is important you talk with me immediately, do not wait until the due date. ***

Extra Credit:

Two opportunities are provided for students to receive extra credit. (1) Five points will be added to essay assignment grades when the paper is reviewed by COM tutors or NetTutor.

COM Tutoring Center – Take a screenshot of the conformation sheet sent to you after the session concludes. Be sure to include what was discussed during the session. Upload this document when the final draft of the essay assignment is submitted.

NetTutor – Take a screenshot of your tutoring session with comments from the tutor. Upload this image when you are submitting the final draft of the assignment.

(2) Five points extra credit will be applied to the final grade for completion of the course evaluation.

Attendance Policy:

Your participation is important to the success of this course. Excessive absences (4+) will result in a failing grade. Four class tardies (or leaving early) will be counted as one absence. Remember: it is your responsibility to drop the course if you are unable to successfully complete it for any reason.

All essays will be submitted to TurnItIn in D2L/Brightspace –a software that checks papers for plagiarism.

Claiming someone else's words (or artificially generated words) as your own (copy / pasting or turning in a borrowed or bought paper) is completely unacceptable. Students who blatantly plagiarize will receive a grade of "0" and will be referred to the Office of Student Conduct for appropriate disciplinary action.

At the instructor's discretion, accidental plagiarism will be dealt with in the following manner: The instructor will counsel the student regarding improper or missing citations. The student will be given an opportunity to revise their work to include the proper citations. The corrected work will receive reduced credit.
