<u>Course Description:</u> This course will provide an overview of human development, from conception to birth. We will explore how people change over time in small ways and large. We will learn about three major domains of human development (biosocial, cognitive and psychosocial) at each life stage (infancy, toddlerhood, preschool, school-aged, adolescence, early adulthood, middle adulthood and late adulthood). Finally, we will deal with the topic of death and how we cope with the end of life in this society.

<u>Course Requirements</u> Grades are based on points accumulated throughout the semester. A variety of means to evaluate student performance will be used throughout the course. There is the possibility of earning 1000 points from assignments and assessments. You are held accountable for completing all assignments on time. - All work must be saved/uploaded as a .PDF or .DOC, (especially for a MAC or I cant open it)
- All work must be submitted on Blackboard and attached to the assignment submission page

- Use double spacing and Arial font size 10 or Times New Roman font size 12.
- Assignments with bulleted and/or numbered items should be a separate and complete paragraph
- Each assignment has a minimum word count or page length, but you are free to write as much as you like. If you write the "minimum", you should expect to receive the minimum grade.
- Your responses must be well thought out with details, explanations, examples and exhibit critical thinking. I
  am looking for you to make a connection between the textbook material and your personal experiences and
  opinions.
- DO NOT USE the Blackboard app to work and submit assignments, the app has been known to lose files, submit incorrectly, and buffer so long assignments are submitted hours after the due date.

<u>Grading Rubrics</u>: Rubrics for coursework can be found on Blackboard under MY GRADES. Click on the blue hyperlink under the assignment to review the rubric. Please read the descriptions very carefully as this will tell you how to earn full credit on each assignment.

- <u>Introduction Post 25 points</u>: You will write a discussion posting introducing yourself to your classmates. The post should read like a short autobiography. You can include any details about yourself that will allow your fellow students to "put a person to the name". Try to focus on details that make you unique.
- Quizzes 375 points: There will be a total of 15 quizzes worth 25 points each. The quizzes are 25 questions in form of multiple choice. You will have 45 minutes to complete the quizzes. You have 2 attempts at the quiz, however, I will only grade the LAST ATTEMPT, not the highest attempt. All quizzes are timed, taken on Blackboard and must be submitted BEOFRE 11:59pm on the deadline date. Once you begin the quiz, you must complete the quiz in one timed session.
- Opinion Paper 100 points: You will write a paper based on your personal opinion regarding issues that are prevalent in our society. The given prompts and detailed instructions are posted on Blackboard
- <u>Discussion Postings 400 points</u>: You will write 4 chapter discussion (100 points each) on the discussion board in Blackboard. Read all the directions posted on Blackboard for more information.
- <u>Presentation 100 points</u>: You will record yourself giving an oral presentation about a topic discussed this semester.

<u>Make-Up & Late Work:</u> There will be no make up work or late work accepted. All course work for the entire semester is open and accessible from the first day of class. I encourage you to work ahead of schedule in case of a personal emergency, illness or any other unforeseen circumstances that would prohibit you from completing your work on time. All assignments are time-stamped in Blackboard and Email. Work submitted after the due date deadline will not be graded. Please allow time for your assignments to upload. If your network server is slow, make sure you allow extra time and do not wait until the last minute to submit assignments. Follow your schedule in your syllabus and do not rely on Blackboard to tell you when something is due. There are computers available for students to use at COM in the library, tutoring center and computer labs if you need a computer and/or internet access.

# **OPINION PAPER**

Respond to all 10 of the prompts below. There is no "right" answer, but you must give in-depth explanations and details to support your responses. I want you to critically think about BOTH SIDES of the argument and then respond. Submit your paper on Blackboard before the due date.

Each numbered prompt needs to be a separate paragraph that is at least 200 words at the minimum (2000 word for the entire paper). You must include your word count on your paper.

- 1. A woman knowingly uses illegal drugs while she is pregnant for recreational use.
- 2. Your child is still being bullied at school even after talking to the teacher and school principal.
- 3. Your closest, most trusted relative disciplined your child and left a small bruise on their bottom.
- 4. Your 4 year old child asks you what sex is.
- 5. A close friend asks if your relationship can include "benefits", to be sexually intimate with each other.
- 6. You just witnessed a woman physically abusing a man and he asked you to help him.
- 7. What do you think are the major factors for people filing for a divorce?
- 8. Your aging parents need full time care, but you cannot afford to move them to a facility or take care of them.
- 9. The government wants to outlaw everyone from owning a gun.
- 10. The government puts a law into effect that states everyone must be vaccinated or face criminal charges

## **PRESENTATION**

You will give a 3-5 minute presentation over any topic that we have covered this semester. Your presentation should include all 3 parts as outlined below; Part 1- key terms that were covered from the text. Part 2- a reference to a news cast, article, video, or book that pertain to the current world issues, and Part 3- input from your own personal experiences and/or beliefs. Upload your presentation to Blackboard and then respond to one of your peers presentations.

**For example**: If I wanted to use bullying for my presentation (you cannot use this one) my presentation would include the following:

Part 1: I would discuss that bullying is talked about in Chapter 6. I would discuss the different types of aggression, maltreatment, and types of bullying. I may even talk about parenting styles and how one style may actually encourage children to bully.

Part 2: I may find a YouTube video showing a child being bullied by his peers and talk about the triggers or outcomes of the participants in the video

Part 3: I may discuss a time in my life when I was once bullied and how that made me feel and affected me later in life.

#### Part 1- Relate to the textbook- YOU MUST USE VOCABULARY WORDS

- 1. What textbook chapter is your video related to?
- 2. What terms from the textbook relate to this topic?
- 3. How does your video selection relate to the information in the textbook?

### Part 2- Relate to current events- YOU MUST INCLUDE A LINK FOR US TO WATCH or READ

- 1. What article did you read pertaining to this subject?
- 2. What video did you watch pertaining to this subject?
- 3. What news station reported on this subject?

### Part 3- Relate to your personal experiences, opinions or beliefs

- 1. What is it about this topic that interests you?
- 2. Do you have personal experiences related to this topic?
- 3. What do you want your fellow classmates to learn from your video?
