
Course Description: A study of the psychology of learning, cognition, and motivation; factors affecting life-long learning; and application of learning strategies in college, career, and life.

HOW TO CALCULATE YOUR GRADE: (Points Earned / Points Possible) X 10 **Example:** You have earned 180 out of 200 possible points so far in the class. You would calculate your current numeric grade by dividing 180 by 200 and then multiplying the result by 100: $180/200 = 0.9 \times 100 = 90 \rightarrow$ Your current numeric grade would be 90%

Assignment Submission Policies: Deadlines can be found in the Tentative Course Schedule at the end of the syllabus and will also be posted to D2L Brightspace. Assignments will always be due on D2L Brightspace by 11:59 PM on the date given unless otherwise specified. Assignments must be submitted as .PDF, .DOC, or .JPEG formats to be accepted. It is good practice to double-check after submitting an assignment (you may re-submit or email your instructor with the correct document if you realize that you made an incorrect submission). NOTE: If for any reason the college closes, continue to work on the assignments as spelled out in your syllabus and on D2L. You are accountable for the work upon the re-opening of the college.

Late Work & Make-Up Policies: Assignments submitted after the deadline will incur a 10% deduction per day late (e.g., 2.5 points will be deducted each day for a late study guide). Please note that technological issues are not an acceptable excuse for a late assignment. Be aware that assignments will become an automatic zero at the point of 10 or more days late with no exceptions. Additionally, late assignments will NOT be accepted after Sunday, May 5th.

In the event of illness or emergency, exceptions may be made on a case-by-case basis at the discretion of the instructor (a doctor's note may be requested in the case of an illness). Attendance Policy: Regular attendance and participation is a critical component to being successful in this course. Students are expected to arrive on time for each class and stay for the duration of the class. Each class, students will complete activities for the Class Participation grade. In-class participation cannot be made up for any reason (including being sick or for emergencies). However, students can miss up to two class days without penalty; after two

missed class days, each additional day's absence or lack of participation will incur a 25-point deduction from the Class Participation grade. Additionally, if you incur four or more tardies throughout the semester, you will be deducted 25 points total from your Class Participation grade (therefore, 4+ tardies = 1 absence). If you miss class, you are responsible for checking the syllabus and familiarizing yourself with the content covered (ask questions as needed).

Communicating with your instructor: ALL electronic communication with the instructor must be through your COM email. Be thorough and provide details from the Occupational Outlook Handbook as well as other sources. Conclude with a paragraph stating how the career you chose is the best fit for you. Your paper should be at least three paragraphs.

- ¶ 1: Introduction (explain what two careers you are considering and why)
- ¶ 2: Second career choice (describe pros & cons and explain why you didn't choose this career)
- ¶ 3: Chosen career (describe the pros & cons and explain why you chose this career)

Career Project Part 3 (25 points) Submit in D2L

2014 UT Commencement Speech

Chapter Presentations Points: 150 total

Each success team is required to develop a presentation on an assigned chapter/habit from the textbook. This will allow each student to get a unique perspective of the teaching/learning process. All team members must have a speaking part. No student(s) should dominate the presentation. Students should include the following components in their presentation:

- 1. Working together, identify the main learning points of the chapter. Each student should complete a detailed **Study Guide** in one of the assigned formats and submit it when completed. Do not move forward with this assignment until everyone in your team has submitted their individual study guide.
- 2. Refer to your completed study guide and create a **PowerPoint** presentation that allows each student in the class to gain insight into the course material. Your PowerPoint should be short, bulleted words/phrases. You will use the PowerPoint as a guide. You will elaborate on the bullet points in your presentation. Become an expert on your habit.
- 3. Have a <u>minimum</u> of one in-class **game** to help strengthen the material. Be creative! You must describe how this activity relates to your habit in your presentation.
- 4. Choose one **activity** from the chapter to have the class complete and discuss.
- 5. Find a **TED Talk** or instructor-approved video pertaining to your topic to show to the class. (20-minute max). You may show two clips adding up to no more than 20 minutes.
- 6. Go to <u>https://collegeinfogeek.com/</u> and find helpful topics such as reading tips, writing tips, memorizing study materials, test taking tips, morning routines, habits, increasing energy/focus or productivity or pick any topic related to your habit. Do not show the clip or article to the class. You will summarize and elaborate on the information you gather.
- 7. **Optional:** include the following topic in your presentation and relate it to your habit. Habit 4-<u>love languages</u>, Habit 5-<u>body language meanings</u>, Habit 6-<u>cultural differences</u> <u>around the world when interacting with others</u>, Habit 7-<u>preventing alzheimer's</u>

Point Breakdown: 20-presentation content and PPT, 20-presentation skills (eye contact, oral communication, tone, volume, enthusiasm, etc.), 10-activities, 20-video, 20-game, 10-College Info Geek, 50 points for attendance during workdays and habit presentations.
