Course Description: This introductory clinical course is designed to provide a beginning level of education and experience in implementing direct client care. Emphasis is placed on the provision of basic care to adult clients and families in structured healthcare settings. Opportunities are provided for the application of theory, concepts, and skills being acquired. Prerequisites: ENGL 1301, BIOL 2402, BIOL 2420, PSYC 2301 with a grade of "C" or better. Co-requisites: PSYC 2314, RNSG 1331 and RNSG 1413

WECM End-of-Course Outcomes: As outlined in the learning plan, apply the theory, concepts, and skills involving specialized materials, tools, equipment, procedures, regulations, laws, and interactions within and among political, economic, environmental, social, and legal systems associated with the occupation and the business/industry; and will demonstrate legal and ethical behavior, safety practices, interpersonal and teamwork skills, and appropriate written and verbal communication skills using the terminology of the

occupation and the business/industry.

Course requirements:

- 1. Nursing Concept Map-Assesses ability to create and implement a basic tool to care for a patient systematically.
- 2. SimChart (Electronic Health Record) Assignment Assesses basic knowledge of documentation practices and their importance.
- 3. Math Competency Exam Assesses proficiency in dosage calculations. Dosage calculation quizzes: Assess knowledge and understanding of dimensional analysis for the calculation of medication doses. Students must score 90% on the math competency exam with 20 questions. Students have 3 chances to take the exam, if they are unsuccessful on the math competency, the student will no longer be able to be enrolled in RNSG 1260 and RNSG 1413.
- **4. Math Quizzes -** Prepares students for the Math Competency Exam.
- **5. Group Project -** Assesses knowledge and understanding of the needs of people in a community setting.
- **6.** Clinical Performance Evaluation- The clinical evaluation tool formatively and summative evaluates the student's clinical performance based on all clinical assignments throughout the semester. Students must meet all essential competencies marked with an asterisk on the clinical performance evaluation tool.
- 7. Bring Your "A" Game—This activity encourages students to self-analyze Work Ethics and reinforces its core values.
- **8. Volunteer Hours**—This program provides an opportunity for students to volunteer face- to-face in the communities in which we serve. Students must complete eight volunteer hours. Some examples of where hours can be completed are the food bank, Health care clinic, senior community center, Galveston Health District, feeding people experiencing homelessness, and health fairs. If the sites are not listed, the facilitator must approve them.
- 9. Shadow Health DCE: Virtual Simulations to improve knowledge and skills.
