Course Description

This course integrates preparation in academic reading skills and skills with writing. Topics include critical reading and writing skills. This course carries institutional credit and may not be used to meet degree requirements. Placement: (1) TSI Essay—score 2 or 3 with TSI Writing multiple choice score of 340-349 or (2) TSI Reading-score of 342-350 or (3) Successful completion ("C" or better) of Read 0340 or ENGL 0330 prior to 8/31/2014 or (4) Successful completion ("C" or better of IRW 0300. This course does not transfer.

Course Requirements:

1. Townsend Press Grammar includes the following: After you complete the grammar pretest, you will complete the skills that you scored a 70 or below on. Also, you will complete 1) Pronouns, 2) Misplaced and Dangling Modifiers, 3) Commas, and 4) Numbers.

Townsend Press Grammar Content is worth 30 percent of your grade.

2. Writing Improvement Reading Quizzes (1) Vocabulary in Context (2) Main Idea (3) Inferences (4) Argument (5) and Critical Reading; read essay narratives, review power point presentations, and complete quizzes.

All quiz assignments are worth 30 percent of your grade.

3.Complete two discussion posts. Posts are worth 15 percent of your grade.

4. Create a Power Point Presentation for Grammar or Reading. Presentation is worth 25 percent of your grade. Present to the class.
