Course Description:

Intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating and critical analysis. Prerequisites: TSIA2 945-990 ELAR/CRC test AND 5 or higher on Essay OR 910-944 on CRC with 5-6 on Diagnostic Test + 5 or higher on Essay, or IRW 0320 with a grade of "C" or better.

Course requirements:

Discussion Prompts: Five discussion prompts will be assigned during the semester. The discussion prompts are intended to be vehicles for topic exploration and development.

Peer Reviews: Four peer review sessions will allow for a more collaborative environment on each essay. Each student is expected to supply a full essay draft to be considered for full participation.

Essays: A total of three short essays of 3-4 pages in length will be required for this semester. See the course calendar for due dates and course pacing of the writing process for each essay. Two of the essays will be related to the research project. These essays will utilize researched sources from the College of the Mainland Library databases.

Research: Students will select a research topic then explore the topic through the researched development of two of the three essays, an annotated bibliography, a presentation, and a completed research paper of 7-8 pages in length. The research paper will be turned in on the last day of class.
