Course Description: History 1302 is a survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the Civil War/Reconstruction era to the present. United States History II examines industrialization, immigration, world wars, the Great Depression, Cold War and post-Cold War eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History II include: American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, urbanization and suburbanization, the expansion of the federal government, and the study of U.S. foreign policy.

This course will emphasize political, social, and economic developments, as well as other significant topics. This course (a) meets the requirements of a college transfer course for four-year degree programs (b) prepares students for upper-division coursework in history (c) prepare students for the academic rigors of upper-division coursework in the social sciences (d) prepares students for developing their critical thinking skills.

Course requirements:

Exams: There will be **four exams** during the semester with a value of **100** points each, 50 points for a Multiple-Choice portion, 50 points for the Essay portion. Exam material will be drawn from quizzes, assigned readings, D2L assignments and all class activities. Students should pay particular attention to terms in the study guides, which will be available on D2L at the beginning of the module. Each exam may consist of multiple-choice questions, short answer, and map questions

Core Objective: Critical Thinking

Essay Exams: There will be **four essay exams** during the semester, these are in addition to the multiple-choice exams you will take in class. Essay Exams will be available from the beginning of a Module, so you will have several weeks to work on these essays. The instructions for the essays will be in D2L.

Assessment Quizzes: In addition to the four exams, there will be 15 quizzes in class to assess your progress between major exams. Quizzes will count for a total of 100 points (10 points for each quiz). Towards the end of the semester the 5 lowest quizzes will be dropped. Like exams, quizzes cannot be made up. Missed quizzes receive a grade of zero. Quizzes address the following Core Objective: Critical Thinking.

Discussion Board: There will be 4 Discussion Board entries. Initial posts need to be at least 100 words and a thorough discussion of the topic question presented. Students must respond to at least two other posters for full credit. Each discussion board post is worth 25 points. Please review the discussion board etiquette in D2L.

Introduction Post: Students will post an Introduction in the appropriate discussion board. Start by introducing yourself. Your name, things that you like to do outside of school. What is your expectation in 5 years, where to you plan to be, and what do you plan to be doing. Also, if you could have dinner with anyone from History, who would it be and why? Respond to two other posters. Please review the Rubric so you know how this discussion will be graded. This is worth 50 points of your grade.

Research Paper: Each student will write a 3-page research paper over a topic in US History from 1877-2008, this paper should be in a research paper format and NO LESS than 3 pages, a works cited page should be included. Follow MLA formatting guidelines, including citations and a works cited page. Paper must be double spaced Times New Roman font, 12 pt. Please review rubric for grading criteria. Before you write your paper, post your topic on the appropriate discussion board. This is to make sure you choose a topic that falls into the scope of this class. If you do not post in the discussion board and get your topic approved, you risk receiving a zero for the paper. You must use at least 3 sources (no textbooks of any kind). You will post your topic in D2L, make sure you don't choose a topic that is already chosen. This discussion is worth 30 points. You will also be required to use the COM Tutoring center to receive feedback for your paper. This will be 25 points of your paper grade. Your paper is 75 points and tutoring is 25 points for a total of 100 points. Students will be required to turn in a Paper proposal which will include the thesis statement and sources you plan to use. The proposal is worth 25 points and detailed instructions are on D2L Brightspace.

Oral Presentations: Each student will create an oral presentation over the topic that you wrote your research paper on. You will follow the directions on the discussion board on how to record and post your presentation. We must see your face in your presentation in order to receive credit. Presentation should be 3-5 minutes long.

Extra Credit: All extra credit assignments are already loaded into D2L. These are the only extra credit assignments that I offer.

All Paper Requirements:

- Spelling and capitalization need to be correct
- All papers must have a title page, be typed, double spaced with a 12 pt font
- All pages must have appropriately sized margins.
- All papers must contain information detailed in the procedure section of these guidelines
- Do not turn in papers you have turned in for a previous class.

Turnitin: All papers will be submitted to Turnitin. Please check your similarity report, this flags plagiarism. Also, Turnitin now checks to see if your paper was written by Artificial Intelligence, you will not see this percentage, but your instructor will. Any percentage of Artificial Intelligence usage will result in a zero for your paper.

Make-Up Policy: There will be NO makeup tests or quizzes given. You are given dates for exams in advance. Please make every effort to be in class on that day as I will not give any make-up. Essays and other papers are available for several weeks, you should be working on them and not wait until the last minute. I will not give extensions on any papers as they are available for weeks. Late work will not be accepted.

No "Recycled Assignments for Course Credit: You may not re-submit an essay or discussion post (or portions thereof) that you did in another course for credit in this course, including material from one of my classes in an earlier semester. Therefore, even if you have done an assignment before in another class, you have to do the assignment from scratch this semester

If you have issues with an assignment you need to see me BEFORE the assignment is due. I cannot help you if you contact me after the assignment is due.

If you have issues with the grade on an assignment DO NOT wait until the end of the semester to say something. I will not go all the way back to look at those assignments.

The instructor is not required to give consideration for lost/missing/unacceptable work stemming from technical non-compliance and/or end-user technical issues. Failure to maintain Internet or computer access shall not constitute a valid excuse for missed work.
