Course Description:

This course involves intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for developing research-based expository and persuasive texts. Emphases are on effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical reading of verbal, visual, and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions. **Specifically, this course will focus on the critical writing and analysis of selected major literary works of prose, poetry, and drama.**

Course Requirements:

Major Assignments: There will be a total of two (2) major literary “thematic” essays required in the course. All major essays will include a “research component” and will require the use of scholarly secondary sources. The third essay will also count as the final exam for the course. All essays must be typed, double-spaced, and display standard 12-size font to receive full credit. All essays should show organization and clarity in their support and delivery of thematic ideas. All major essays should illustrate proper MLA format including proper “in-text documentation” and a “works cited page” at the end of the paper. Daily grades will be determined by selected reading response assignments, several short 2-page critical essay assignments, and other selected analysis activities. **There will also be a final research paper, which also counts as the final exam given at the conclusion of the semester.**

Policy on Late Assignment Submissions – Major Essays, Daily Work Assignments & Other Class Policies

- ❖ All assignments including *Daily Assignments*, *Major Essays*, and the *Final Research Paper / Final Exam* MUST be completed and submitted to the designated assignment dropbox by the designated due date and time stated on the course syllabus. **No late submissions of any assignments within the above categories will be accepted beyond the noted due date and time indicated on the course syllabus.**
- ❖ Any assignments including *Daily Assignments*, *Major Essays*, and the *Final Research Paper / Final Exam Assignment* not submitted to the designated assignment dropbox by the designated due date and time indicated on the course syllabus will be issued a grade of zero and no make-up will be allowed!
- ❖ Please note that once an assignment is submitted into the dropbox (**early or on time**), once it is graded, it cannot be revised and resubmitted for a different grade. **Once an assignment is initially graded, that grade MUST stand!**
- ❖ All assignment dropboxes are set to "**Multiple Submission Attempts**" considering common unexpected technology glitches, or submission errors that often occur when submitting assignments, ultimately creating a necessity to submit multiple drafts of your assignment. Please be aware that if you submit multiple drafts, only "**ONE**" submission attempt, your "**LAST**" and "**MOST RECENT**" submission will be graded. Therefore, please note that it is your responsibility to ensure that your "**LAST SUBMISSION ATTEMPT**" is indeed the one that you wish to be graded.

Policy on Assignment Grading & Feedback:

- ❖ **Daily Reading & Short Essay Responses:** These assignments are a part of your attendance / daily work grade and will be graded “holistically” on originality (non-plagiarized), your ability to thoroughly, and accurately answer the specified questions in response to the given reading or short essay assignment prompt.
- ❖ **Short Essay Responses:** These assignments will be graded in a “holistic” fashion using a traditional essay rubric focusing on originality (non-plagiarized), the elements of content, a strongly presented argument, properly integrated secondary sources, accurately presented MLA formatting, grammar, sentence structure, properly formatted in-text citations, and a properly formatted works cited page.
- ❖ **Major Research-Based Essay Assignments:** All Major Essays including the Final Research Paper / Final Exam will be graded in a “holistic” fashion using a traditional essay rubric focusing on originality (non-plagiarized), the elements of content, a strongly presented argument, properly integrated secondary sources, accurately presented MLA formatting, grammar, sentence structure, properly formatted in-text citations, and a properly formatted works cited page.
- ❖ In regard to grade percentages, although each assignment is capped at 100%, grades of 100 are not issued on essays or reading response assignments. The only instance where grades of 100 are possible will be if a **“multiple-choice” exam** is given, which means **“exact”** answers are possible.

As English is a “**subjective**” course, there are always opportunities for growth, improvement, and a diverse range of interpretation whereas STEM courses – *Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics*, or other STEM related courses are classified as “**objective**,” meaning **Exact, Technical, and Definitive** responses are the norm.

- ❖ Specific and detailed feedback for all assignments will be left in the “**Assignment Feedback Box**” so that you can continuously monitor your grades on each assignment and build on your academic progress throughout the semester.
- ❖ Overall, in regard to the grade of A, if you are receiving grades in the range of **90 – 95/96**, on any “written” assignment, you are performing at an acceptable level unless I inform you of any assignment deficiencies.
- ❖ If there are any assignment deficiencies that are negatively impacting your grade, I will explicitly highlight these deficiencies in the **Assignment Feedback Section**.
- ❖ Moreover, please note that the college is not on a plus / minus system in regard to grades; therefore, **a grade of 90 or 100 only results in a flat grade of an A, not an A- or A+.**

Policy on Assignment Formatting Expectations

- ❖ All major and short essay assignments, daily reading responses, as well as the Final Research Paper / Final Exam must be typed in proper, current **MLA formatting** and submitted to the designated assignment dropbox as a regular **Microsoft Word Document**.
- ❖ All assignments must also be typed double-spaced, Times New Roman, and display standard 12-size font. **Submitting handwritten scanned photo images of assignments is not acceptable and will receive an automatic grade of zero!**

- ❖ For a full review of formal MLA structure and essay formatting expectations, as well as proper “documentation” formatting for in-text citations and the “Works Cited page,” which is required for all “research-based essays / assignments, please review the “**Purdue Online Writing Lab**” website: <https://owl.purdue.edu/>

Attendance Policy for “In-Person” Classes

- ❖ Class attendance will be taken during each class session for the duration of the semester. All students must remain actively engaged in class for the duration of class time until officially dismissed by the professor of the class. Leaving class early before being officially dismissed will result in your attendance for the day being voided.
- ❖ For “**Hybrid Classes**,” all students are **REQUIRED** to attend the “in-person” day of the class. Failure to properly attend the “in-person” day of a hybrid class will result in the same penalties applicable to a fully in-person class.
- ❖ Students must report to class at the official start of class time. Any student arriving 30 minutes late or more will receive a full absence for the day.
- ❖ Upon acquiring 3 absences, a student's grade will be lowered one letter grade. All subsequent absences will result in the lowering of an additional letter grade.

Attendance Policy for “Online” Classes:

- ❖ For online courses, attendance will be monitored through your daily logging in to submit your assignments by their designated due date and time.

- ❖ Logging in only “once” a week is not acceptable and will not facilitate your success in the course. To maintain acceptable attendance in an “online” course, you must log in to the course a minimum of 5 times a week.

Proper Etiquette in the Online & In-Person Classroom:

- ❖ No disrespectful commentary will be tolerated at any time under any circumstances. Any student who makes a disrespectful comment to the instructor on any submitted assignment, or to another student during any in-person or online class session, online discussion forum, on writing prompt responses, or on any other assignment or activity will receive a zero for the day’s activity.
- ❖ Any student displaying any form of “**verbal**” or “**written**” disrespectful commentary to their instructor or another student, or any type of offensive commentary “**verbal**” or “**Written**,” including, but not limited to profanity, racially discriminatory comments, discrimination against sexual orientation, general sexually explicit comments, religious discrimination etc. will not be tolerated and referred to a conference with the English Department Chair, the Campus Dean of Students Office, or will be possibly administratively dropped from class.
- ❖ During “**In-Person Classes**,” any student(s) consistently talking during class, consistently harassing other students for paper, writing utensils, or any other class materials, or engaging in any other type of noisy disruptive behavior that is disruptive to the class lecture, or learning process will be issued “**one**” warning to cease the disruptive behavior.
- ❖ If the disruptive behavior does not cease after the warning, the student(s) will be asked to leave class, will be referred to a conference with the English Department Chair or the Campus Dean of Students Office, and will be possibly administratively dropped from the class.
- ❖ At this level, we are all adults; therefore, we must act like it at all times. Juvenile behavior will not be tolerated under any circumstances.

Policy on Academic Honesty &

AI – ChatGPT Generated Assignments

- ❖ In regard to maintaining "**academic integrity**," please note that ALL assignments MUST be originally written and cannot be plagiarized on any level.

- ❖ Please note that on the first incident of academic dishonesty, any assignment found to be written via "**AI – ChatGPT**," purchased off the internet, or exhibiting any other form of plagiarism will receive an automatic zero.

- ❖ If the sources used to support a major essay assignment, or any other type of regular daily assignment are found to be FICTIOUS (FAKE) on any level, cannot be located upon being searched, if the specified author is found to have not authored the specified source, or if the URL link accompanying a given source does not ultimately lead to the specified source, the source(s) will not be honored and the assignment as a whole will be issued a failing grade.
- ❖ On a second incident of academic dishonesty, any assignment found to be written via "**AI – ChatGPT**," purchased off the internet, or exhibiting any other form of plagiarism will receive an automatic zero, the student will be administratively dropped from the course, and the incident will be referred to college administration for appropriate disciplinary action.

- ❖ The English department has programs in place to detect plagiarized papers / assignments generated via "**AI - ChatGPT**" or purchased off the internet. Please note that this is a violation of the Houston Community College System policy on academic integrity and will result in severe consequences that can negatively impact a student's academic record on a permanent basis.

Academic Dishonesty:

- ❖ Any incident of academic policy will be dealt with in accordance with college policy and the Student Handbook. Any form of academic dishonesty is an extremely serious offense that will result in a **grade of zero** on the given assignment, and the student will be referred to the Office of Student Conduct / Dean of Students Office, or other appropriate administrator for appropriate disciplinary action.

- ❖ *Plagiarism*: Plagiarism is using someone else's words or ideas and claiming them as your own. Plagiarism is a very serious offense. Plagiarism includes paraphrasing someone else's words without giving proper citation, copying directly from a website and pasting it into your paper, or using someone else's words without quotation marks. Any assignment containing any plagiarized material will receive a **grade of zero**, and the student will be referred to the Office of Student Conduct / Dean of Students Office, or other appropriate administrator for appropriate disciplinary action.

- ❖ The plagiarism and academic dishonesty policy applies to all assignments completed and submitted for this class. If you use any form of data from another source, you must document that data properly using MLA standards. Making up quotes, sources, authors, or any other form of falsifying information will be construed as academic dishonesty. Moreover, reusing your own assignments from an earlier class or this class is known as **Self-Plagiarism** and is also a violation and a form of academic dishonesty.

- ❖ **I will respond to all emails within 24 – 48 hours.**
