Other Supplies: Access to MS Word and the internet is vital for success in this course. Additional students will benefit from maintaining all work organized on a flash drive or OneDrive (available to all students through College of the Mainland).

Course Description:

Intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating and critical analysis.

Prerequisites: One of the following TSI score combinations or equivalent developmental courses with a grade of "C" or better (1) TSI Reading 351 and TSI Writing 340 and TSI Essay 4; or (2) TSI Reading 351 and TSI Writing less than 340 with ABE 4 and TSI Essay 5.

Course requirements:

This semester we will work through the writing process for three short essays, a lengthy research paper, and an oral presentation. The writing process will be emphasized through class discussions, journal responses, peer reviews, short and longer written works, and a presentation. Students will utilize both informal and academic writing modes as they complete researched essays.

1. *Course Activities (10%)* – All journals, discussions, and periodic quizzes, will be included in this category for class. Keep in mind attendance and preparation is mandatory and vital for your academic success (see note on the personal responsibility grade component).
****Successful submission of all course assignments will be required each week to count for class attendance.***
2. *Revising and Editing Activities (20%)* – Students are expected to participate in revision and editing activities through the discussion board for each of the papers, prior to final draft submission.
3. *Short Essay Assignments (25%)* – Students are required to complete two short essay papers. Assignment sheets will be supplied in the course content folders to clarify assignment details.
4. *Argumentative Research Project (30%)* – The research project will focus on the characteristics of the argumentative structure. This project will require the completion of an outline of the paper with Work Cited page. More information on this will be provided in the Course Content on D2L/Brightspace.
5. *End of Course Reflection (15%)* – The course will conclude with a reflection paper or recorded presentation. More specifics for this assignment will be provided in the course content folders.

***** A note on Personal Responsibility*****

The personal responsibility grade will be included in the Course Activities grade category and will be assessed at the end of the semester. Students are expected to read and view all required course content materials, utilize the Course Toolbox provided in the Resources folder on D2L/Brightspace, utilize NetTutor and the COM Tutoring Center, carefully read and follow all instructions, and turn in all required assignments by the designated due date and time.

Online students are expected to participate in class discussion posts and provide timely feedback on revision/editing exercises.

Make-Up/Late Work Policy:

All assignments are due by 11:59 p.m. on the posted due date. Students are expected to be aware of the due dates and manage their projects accordingly. Assignment sheets for each major project will be provided containing the relevant due dates, assignment criteria, and the grading rubric for transparency of expectations. A grace period of three days after the due date will be provided to account for last-minute issues. A deduction of 10 percentage points will apply to each assignment submitted during this grace period. After this date, students who have not submitted the assignment will receive a grade of “0”. Deadlines will only be extended for cases involving military service, religious holidays, or **documented** emergencies.

*** If you are having trouble meeting a deadline for a major assignment, it is important you talk with me immediately, do not wait until the due date. ***

Extra Credit:

Two opportunities are provided for students to receive extra credit. (1) Five points will be added to essay assignment grades when the paper is reviewed by COM tutors or NetTutor.

COM Tutoring Center – Take a screenshot of the conformation sheet sent to you after the session concludes. Be sure to include what was discussed during the session. Upload this document when the final draft of the essay assignment is submitted. The extra credit will be applied to the final grade of the essay.

NetTutor – Save the tutor’s feedback (the summary and paper with comments). Upload this file along with the final draft of your paper to the assignment submission link. The extra credit will be applied to the final grade of the essay.

(2) Three points extra credit will be applied to the final grade for completion of the course evaluation. Take a screenshot of the survey completion page and upload it to the extra credit assignment link in Brightspace. The points will be added to your final semester grade when it is recorded in WebAdvisor.

Attendance Policy:

Your participation is important to the success of this course. Students are required to login at least twice weekly to check course announcements and complete assignments. Successful attendance is based on completed assignments each week.

Avoiding Plagiarism: Research material must be cited both in the document and on a Work Cited Page. (MLA documentation style applies to all College of the Mainland English, humanities, philosophy, or speech classes). Remember to document when:

- ✓ Evidence is quoted directly from a source.
- ✓ Ideas from another source are paraphrased or summarized.
- ✓ Facts (i.e. statistics) or visual material from other sources must be documented.
