Course Description:

English 1302 involves the intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for development research-based expository and persuasive texts. Emphases are on the effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical reading of verbal, visual, and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions.

Prerequisite: An earned grade of "C" or better in English 1301.

Course requirements: (including description of any special projects or assignments): Length and requirements for each assignment will vary and will be explained as assigned.

1. Class Participation/Peer Discussion/Attendance (100 points) – There will be times throughout the semester where we will have open discussion regarding our current reading/lectures. Students are expected to engage in positive discussion within our course meetings. Attendance will be kept daily as part of our course participation grade too.

2. Journal Response Assignments: (15 pts each) Eight reading reflections/journal assignments will be based on classroom discussion/reading and essay assignments.

3. Argumentative Essay (150 pts) – An Argumentative Essay will be assigned during the semester. The essay will need to be completed in MLA format and 3-4 pages in length. Additional information will be given during the semester.

3. Additional Assignments: Diagnostic Response assignment is a one-page response on an assigned topic (100 pts), Quizzes – there will be four quizzes throughout the semester (20 pts each/80 pts total), Character Analysis Assignment is a one-page analysis of an assigned reading (100pts), and Annotated Bibliography for our research project (50 pts).

4. Research Analysis Project (250 pts each) – One researched essay will be assigned utilizing the MLA paper format and 6-7 pages in length. Topics will be assigned/discussed during class.

5. Project Presentation (50 pts) – A project presentation will be completed covering our research analysis projects. This presentation will function as our course final.
