Course Description:

This course provides an intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis is on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis.

Course Requirements:

This course is a writing intensive course. For each major writing assignment, you will take your essay through the writing process and need to submit multiple drafts before you submit your final draft. This allows you to receive feedback from both peers and instructor before you submit an assignment for a major grade.

In addition to major writing assignments, you will also complete other assignments such as discussions, peer review, supplemental reading materials analysis, and quizzes.

Grading:

You are more than welcome to email me any questions you may have about your grades at any point during the semester.

Please email me through school email for any grade questions you may have for me for privacy. FERPA prevents me from responding to any grade requests other than those coming from your official school email.

The major writing assignments will be graded with rubrics I have created from the revision handouts I will share with you. Students will have access to the revision handout during the revision process.

Grade Conversion:

In order to tally grades, I convert all letters to a numbering system based on the following scale: A = 90 - 100; B = 80 - 89; C = 70-79; D = 60 - 69; F = less than 60.

Work Policy - Late Work and Extra-Credit Policy: Late Work:

All homework assignments and major assignments are due by the deadline stated unless I announce a change or unless you have made special arrangements with me. All work submitted after the due date will lose ten points for every day it is late. No work will be accepted after the last day of the course.

Since deadlines are published ahead of time, it is the student's responsibility to turn in all homework and major assignments on time. All assignments are expected to be submitted by the due date. If not, the assignment will be considered late.

To make sure you meet all deadlines, try to turn all assignments in at least five minutes before the time the assignment is due! Technology glitches are stressful and inconvenient when you are working diligently to meet a deadline.

Plan ahead, so that you are not submitting assignments late and losing points.

If something is going on that you think I need to know about, let me know. I completely understand that sometimes when life happens it is more than just forgetting an assignment due date. I can't work with you if I don't know you are dealing with big things.

All final drafts of major assignments are turned in through Brightspace only.

I understand that sometimes life happens, so I will allow you to turn in one assignment one day late, without losing any points, throughout the semester (this excludes the final exam and portions of the writing process).

Extra Credit:

Extra credit may be earned once throughout the semester by attending (in person or online) an educational or professional event through the college or in your local community. Attendance Policy:

Since this is an online course, it is important to login to Brightspace multiple times a week. Monday is when assignments open for the week. If you don't have alerts set up for Brightspace, I recommend logging in every couple of days just to check in to see if any announcements have been posted.

Our class is offered as an asynchronous, online course, so we won't meet on a specific day or time, so there are no official absences or attendance issues. It is up to you to log into Brightspace and Google Meet, when you need to work or need help.

Because we don't meet face to face, it is important to pay attention to the tentative schedule for each major writing assignment.

It is also important to read through all documents posted in each module and to complete all assignments by the due date/ time.

I will send out announcements as reminders for when an assignment is due and other class related information, so login (2x min.) throughout the week to make sure you are on track.

Communicating with Your Instructor: ALL electronic communication with the instructor must be through your COM email. Due to FERPA restrictions, faculty cannot share any information about performance in the class through other electronic means. (Faculty may add additional statement requiring monitoring and communication expectations via D2L or other LMS)

Communication by Email:

The easiest and fastest way to reach me is by email.

Remember - all class correspondence should be conducted through your school email account or Brightspace account. Conversations about grades or student specific issues must go through your school accounts.

Academic Dishonesty:

Academic Honesty in Academic Writing:

The key to becoming a better writer is to write and to pay careful attention to the reading, thinking, discussing, drafting, and revising you'll be doing in class to build on the writing skills you already have. Writers of all kinds need to engage in these activities to help them communicate the validity of their ideas to an audience with expectations in place about what they'll be reading.

Unintentional plagiarism occurs when there is clumsy citing of sources; it's not done correctly, but it's clear that the writer was attempting to give credit to the author. Any instance of unintentional plagiarism will lower the final grade of a major assignment, and excessive examples of unintentional plagiarism may lower a final grade of a major paper to the point where the paper could receive a failing grade.

Intentional plagiarism occurs when a student copies large amounts of information from sources without giving any credit to the authors. This can range from copying and pasting material from multiple sources without citing them, or using AI programs to generate text, as AI frequently pulls from material fed to it from the internet. Buying or copying student papers from the internet would also be an example of intentional plagiarism.

I am available to help you with any questions you may have about the use of sources within your writing and about your accuracy in paraphrasing sources or directly quoting them. I encourage you to make an appointment with me to discuss specific questions you may have about your citation work.

COM Humanities Department Policy Statement: Plagiarism

Plagiarism is a form of academic dishonesty. To plagiarize is to steal the words or ideas of another and pass them off as one's own. Two forms of plagiarism are common. In the first form, the writer incorporates published or otherwise recorded material without properly acknowledging its sources. In the second form, the writer submits work actually done by someone else. (The student who allows his/her work to be used by others is also guilty.) Any student who plagiarizes will receive a grade of "0" on his/her plagiarized work and may, as a result, receive a failing grade in the course. Ignorance will not be an acceptable defense: all students are responsible for familiarizing themselves with the rules of documentation. Violation of the Plagiarism Policy may result in a referral to the College of the Mainland Judicial Coordinator or further disciplinary actions as stated in the current Student Handbook.

"Source" may refer to published works (including material available from electronic/computer networks or databases), electronically broadcast programs, films, recordings, interviews, speeches, or lectures.

- 1. You must document when you quote directly from another source.
- 2. You must document when you paraphrase words from another source.
- 3. You must document when you summarize ideas from another source.
- 4. You must document when you use facts (statistics in a chart or graph, for example) or visual material from another source.
