#### **IRW 0320 Course Description:**

This course is a co-requisite class for English Composition 1301. This course integrates preparation in academic reading skills and skills with writing a variety of academic assignments. Topics include critical reading and writing skills. Students will be expected to write compositions similar to those assigned in English 1301. This course carries institutional credit and may not be used to meet degree requirements. Placement: (1) TSI Essay—score 2 or 3 with TSI Writing multiple choice score of 340-349 or (2) TSI Reading-score of 342-350 or (3) Successful completion ("C"or better) of Read 0340 or ENGL 0330 prior to 8/31/2014 or (4) Successful completion ("C" or better of IRW 0300. This course does not transfer.

**Professor's Suarez Personal Course Description:** I believe that writing and reading are multi-faceted, meaning they can apply and be useful to all aspects of life. I push this concept in ENGL 1301, but further it in IRW. Each week you will be practicing formal writing/reading, fundamentals of writing, and also writing for yourself. All of this aims to help you be successful in ENGL 1301 while also cultivating and building your relationship with the English subject as a whole.

## **Course Requirements:**

**Participation/Attendance/ENGL 1301 Effort:** Because this course is aimed to help you be successful in ENGL 1301, your participation in this course is crucial. Participation involves attending as many classes as you can, using class time to workshop your assignments for ENGL 1301, and completing grammar practices, free responses and other required assignments.

**ENGL 1301 Journal:** This is the same journal as the one you are expected to complete in ENGL 1301. On Mondays, you will be given the opportunity to use class time to write an entry. You can journal about whatever you desire. I will not read these (unless you would like me to). The point of this journal is to discover a new avenue of writing – one that is for you and only you. This journal is a completion grade with a requirement of at least 32 entries by W 12/13

**Free Responses (FR):** Every Wednesday, you will be required to complete a free response discussion post based on a given prompt. Requirements will vary per week; however, these responses will be aimed at using formal Standard Written English and learning how to express your critical thinking through writing

**Grammar Practice:** Each week (except for week 8 + 16), I will be introducing a new grammar concept. With each concept there will be a practice packet with worksheets/activities to prepare you for the grammar concept quiz the following week. You may not take the grammar concept quiz until you have completed the practice packet for that grammar concept.

**Grammar Concept Quizzes:** Each week at the start of class, you will take a grammar concept quiz that covers the material that we learned from the previous week. We will spend time each day working together, in groups, and separately on grammar exercises to make you feel prepared for the weekly quiz. If you are absent on a quiz day and miss a quiz, you will have the opportunity to make up the quiz on a designated day that we agree on.

**Grammar Concept Midterm + Final:** Week 8 and Week 16 will include a mastery exam that will cover the grammar concepts that we have practiced and learned together. The questions you see on these exams are questions you will have already seen before on previous quizzes (in other words, keep your quizzes!). Leading up to these exams, there will be review games that can earn you extra credit points as long as you are presenta and participate.

**Course Grade Determination:** This course is designed to ensure your success in ENGL 1301, but it is also aimed at more than just "academic" success in this classroom. The goal is to challenge you to become better at life skills that will carry into other aspects of your life, such as time management, effort, engagement, and responsibility. I will also push you to reimagine new ways of thinking about writing, language, and ultimately identity. That being said, as long as you are willing to put forth effort, be open minded and work to the best of your ability, you will pass this course.

A Note on Written Feedback: I will read all of your work throughout the semester. I will never give critiques on your free write journaling. That part of the course is designed as a stress-free space where you can feel empowered to write about what you want and not worry about it being evaluated. On the other hand, I will offer feedback on all other work, and we will have multiple one-on-one check-ins to discuss your work in ENGL 1301 and IRW.

Late Work/Make-Up Policy: Most work in this course will be completed in class. As a result, the only "late work" that can occur is if you are absent and do not complete the grammar practice, freewriting, or free responses for the day. It is your responsibility to let me know if you will be absent and ask about what you missed/will be missing. Freewrites do not need to be "made up" since the due date is not until the last week of the semester, so make sure you keep up with your journal if you miss a Monday. If you miss a quiz, it is your responsibility to contact me about making up the quiz. You may turn in your grammar practice on the next class day for full credit.

**Extra Credit Opportunities:** The only extra credit I offer for this course is related to earning extra credit for upcoming guizzes or exams.

**Attendance Policy:** Attendance is required to be successful in the class. I understand things come up. Please communicate with me if you need to miss and I will work with you to get caught up on anything you might miss. Note that no absences are considered excused when it comes to the attendance grade.

**Academic Dishonesty:** Any incident of academic policy will be dealt with per college policy and the Student Handbook. Academic dishonesty – such as cheating on exams – is an extremely serious offense and will result in a grade of zero on that exam, assignment, or project, and the student will be referred to the Office of Student Conduct for the appropriate disciplinary action.

**Plagiarism:** Plagiarism is using someone else's words or ideas and claiming them as your own. Plagiarism includes paraphrasing someone else's words without proper citation, copying directly from a website, and pasting it into your paper, and/or using someone else's words without quotation marks. Any assignment containing any plagiarized material will receive a grade of zero, and the student will be referred to the Office of Student Conduct for the appropriate disciplinary action. There are many types of plagiarism, and you may not be aware of all. If you are not sure if you are violating these rules, please talk to me about it before turning in your work.
