Course Description:

General Psychology is a survey of the major psychological topics, theories and approaches to the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. Prerequisites: TSIA2 945-990 ELAR/CRC test AND 5 or higher on Essay OR 910-944 on CRC with 5-6 on Diagnostic Test + 5 or higher on Essay, or IRW 0320 with a grade of "C" or better. This is an academic transfer course.

Determination of Course Grade

Class Discussions and Attendance (10%):

Because class discussion and in-class exercises are critical to the learning process, they will count as a portion of your final grade. PLEASE BE ON TIME FOR CLASS. Attendance will be taken within the first 10 minutes of class, anyone showing up to class after attendance has been taken will be considered absent. This not only provides for an opportunity to participate in class discussion, but also provides a relatively easy way for students to earn points toward a higher grade.

Chapter Quizzes (20%):

Quizzes will be assigned for most chapters and will cover textbook, lecture, videos, class demonstrations, and handouts. Assigned quizzes will be given at the completion of a chapter and will be due by Sunday of the assigned week. There are **NO Make-up Quizzes**.

I will <u>DROP YOUR LOWEST 2 Quiz Grades</u> to account for any technical problems and/or missed attempts. The remainder of your quiz grades will be used to calculate the quiz percentage that will be applied to calculate your final grade.

Writing Assignments (20%):

Daily Writing assignments will be assigned for most chapters. Writing Assignments will be completed at the beginning of class.

All students must complete the Writing Assignments on the scheduled date. There are **NO Make-up Writing Assignments**.

More information and detailed instructions about the writing assignments will be provided on the days they are assigned.

Discussion Forum Posts (20%):

Each student will be required to complete and 14 Discussion Forum posts throughout the semester. These posts will allow you to discuss a topic related to the assigned chapter in greater depth.

Each Discussion Forum Post has the following instructions:

- 1. Review the assigned article(s) or video(s)
- 2. Post a brief description of the topic and discuss what they have learned
- 3. Post a brief summary of their thoughts are on the topic
- 4. Reply to a minimum of one other student's posts and rate it

Each Discussion Forum Post will be worth a **maximum of 15 points**.

You will earn up to 5 points for your description of the topic and what you have learned, up to 5 points for your thoughts on the topic, and up to 5 points for your reply to another student.

NOTE: Responses can be deleted at the discretion of the instructor. Responses will only be deleted if the instructor determines them to be aggressive, rude, degrading, etc., and they may be deleted without notice to the student. All such responses will receive a grade of 0 for the deleted thread. Please refer to the syllabus for more information regarding student conduct and expectations.

Research Project (30%):

Each student will be required to complete a research project. The project will include a written and an oral component. This assignment will help students examine some of the ethical issues within psychology and identify how these impact our society on the community, state and national level. Further, this presentation will allow students to examine the importance of being knowledgeable of their own personal biases and/or stereotypes, and how they can be more informed in their future interactions.

Students <u>may choose their topic or one will be assigned.</u> Examples of research paper topics include, but are not limited to, Gender and Sexuality, Sexual Orientation: Nature vs. Nurture, Living with Psychological Disorders. Grading Rubric and more detailed information will be provided after according to the course schedule/calendar.

Extra Credit (Optional):

Extra Credit opportunities will be provided throughout the semester for students to earn points toward a higher grade. All extra credit must be approved by the instructor and turned in prior to Week 13.
