Course Description: A study of the psychology of learning, cognition, and motivation; factors affecting life-long learning; and application of learning strategies in college, career and life.

Course Requirements:

Scavenger Hunt: Students will visit specified areas around campus and write down notes about the services offered and/or take a photo (see worksheet at the end of the syllabus) (100 points).

Study Guides: For each habit in your textbook (F, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7), you are responsible for completing a study guide in the format indicated in the course schedule and D2L $(8 \times 25 \text{ points each} = 200 \text{ total points})$.

Career Project

- Part 1 Career Research: Students will visit use the Occupational Outlook
 Handbook at www.bls.gov/ooh/ to complete a worksheet about two career options of
 their choice. Students will complete and submit this worksheet in class.
- o **Part 2 Compare/Contrast Paper:** Students will complete a typed 2-page paper elaborating on the pros and cons of the two careers that were researched in Part 1 of the Career Project. Students are to submit the paper in D2L (25 points). (See below for full details).
- Part 3 Social Responsibility Reflection: Complete a written reflection in which
 you state your chosen career and discuss how it plays a role in social responsibility.
 Students are to submit the paper in D2L (25 points). (See below for full details).

- o **Part 4 Personal Success Reflection:** Complete a written reflection about how you will use each of the seven (7) habits in your chosen career. Students are to submit the paper in D2L (25 points). (See below for full details).
- o **Part 5 Presentation:** Using the information from the previous four parts of this project, prepare a 5-minute oral/visual presentation about your chosen career (100 points). (See below for full details).

Chapter/Habit Presentation: Students will use their study guides to develop a presentation on an assigned chapter/habit from the textbook with their success team (150 points). (See below for full details).

Campus Connections: Students must attend an advising appointment, visit the tutoring center, attend a campus event, and write a letter to future PSYC 130 students (100 total points). (See below for full details).

Attendance and Participation: Students are expected to attend each class, arrive on time, stay for the duration of class, and actively participate in class discussion and activities (250 points). (25 points are deducted for each absence, tardy, early departure, or lack of participation).

Based upon the information you collect on the two careers (from Part 1), type a 2 full page double-spaced Times New Roman (MLA Style) paper elaborating on the pros and cons of each career. Be thorough and provide details from the Occupational Outlook Handbook as well as other sources. Conclude with a paragraph stating how the career you chose is the best fit for you. Your paper should be at least three paragraphs:

- ¶ 1: Introduction (explain what two careers you are considering and why)
- ¶ 2: Second career choice (describe pros & cons and explain why you didn't choose this career)
- ¶ 3: Chosen career (describe the pros & cons and explain why you chose this career)

Career Project Part 3: Social Responsibility Reflection (25 points) Submit in D2L

The idea of social responsibility is built on a system of ethics, in which decisions and actions are evaluated before proceeding. If the action or decision causes harm to society or the environment, then it would be socially irresponsible. In 5-10 sentences, describe in detail how your chosen career plays a role in social responsibility. Be sure to start your paper by stating your chosen career.

Chapter Presentations Points: 150 total

Each success team is required to develop a presentation on an assigned chapter/habit from the textbook. This will allow each student to get a unique perspective of the teaching/learning process. All team members must have a speaking part. No student(s) should dominate the presentation. Students should include the following components in their presentation:

- 1. Working together, identify the main learning points of the chapter. Each student should complete a detailed **Study Guide** in one of the assigned formats and submit it when completed. Do not move forward with this assignment until everyone in your team has submitted their individual study guide.
- 2. Refer to your completed study guide and create a **PowerPoint** presentation that allows each student in the class to gain insight into the course material. Your PowerPoint should be short, bulleted words/phrases. You will use the PowerPoint as a guide. You will elaborate on the bullet points in your presentation. Become an expert on your habit.
- 3. Have a <u>minimum</u> of one in-class **game** to help strengthen the material. Be creative! You must describe how this activity relates to your habit in your presentation.
- 4. Choose one **activity** from the chapter to have the class complete and discuss.
- 5. Find a **TED Talk** or instructor-approved video pertaining to your topic to show to the class. (20-minute max). You may show two clips adding up to no more than 20 minutes.
- 6. Go to https://collegeinfogeek.com/ and find helpful topics such as reading tips, writing tips, memorizing study materials, test taking tips, morning routines, habits, increasing energy/focus or productivity or pick any topic related to your habit. Do not show the clip or article to the class. You will summarize and elaborate on the information you gather.
- 7. **Optional:** include the following topic in your presentation and relate it to your habit. Habit 4-love languages, Habit 5-body language meanings, Habit 6-cultural differences around the world when interacting with others, Habit 7-preventing alzheimer's

Point Breakdown: 20-presentation content and PPT, 20-presentation skills (eye contact, oral communication, tone, volume, enthusiasm, etc.), 10-activities, 20-video, 20-game, 10-College Info Geek, 50 points for attendance during workdays and habit presentations.
