Course Description: A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the pre-Columbian era to the Civil War/Reconstruction period. United States History I includes the study of pre-Columbian, colonial, revolutionary, early national, slavery and sectionalism, and the Civil War and Reconstruction eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History I include American settlement and diversity, American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, and creation of the federal government

Course requirements:

Exams: There will be **four exams** during the semester. Exam material will be drawn from quizzes, assigned readings, D2L/Brightspace assignments and any recorded lectures. Students should pay attention to terms in the study guides, available on D2L at the start of the module. Each exam may consist of multiple-choice questions.

Core Objective: Critical Thinking

Writing Portion Exams: There will be **four writing portion exams** during the semester, these are in addition to the multiple-choice exams. The instructions for the writing portion will be on D2L. If your paper is shorter than the required pages, points will be also take in Content as well as the length of paper.

Discussion Boards: Each week there will be a discussion board topic. Initial posts are due by Fridays, with two responses due by Sunday. Responses should add to the discussion and be more than a couple of sentences. Detailed instructions are in D2L.

Introduction Post: Students will post an Introduction in the appropriate discussion board. Start by introducing yourself. Your name, things that you like to do outside of school. What is your expectation in 5 years, where to you plan to be, and what do you plan to be doing. Also, if you could have dinner with anyone from History, who would it be and why? Respond to two other posters. Please review the Rubric so you know how this discussion will be graded.

Research Paper: Each student will write a 5-page research paper on a topic in US History from 1877 – 2010.. This paper should be in a research paper format and **NO LESS** than 5 pages. A works cited page should be included. Follow MLA formatting guidelines, including citations and a works cited page. Paper must be double spaced Times New Roman font, 12 pnt. You must use at least 5 sources (**no textbooks of any kind**).

You will also be **required** to use the COM Tutoring center to receive feedback for your paper. Students will be required to turn in a Paper proposal and view the feedback before you will be able to turn in your Research Paper which will include the thesis statement and sources you plan to use. If your paper is shorter than the required 5 full pages, points will be taken in the Creating an Argument, Critical Skills and Length of paper.

The Research Paper Assignment will be graded using the following formula:

Oral Presentations: Each student will create an oral presentation over the topic that you wrote your research paper on. You will not read the paper but give a presentation telling us what you learned about the subject. Students will create their video on the appropriate discussion board. The presentations should be 3-5 minutes long.

Oral Presentations: Each student will create an oral presentation over the topic that you wrote your research paper on. You will follow the directions on the discussion board on how to record and post your presentation. We must see your face in your presentation in order to receive credit. Presentation should be 3-5 minutes long.

Extra Credit: All extra credit assignments are already loaded into D2L. These are the only extra credit assignments that I offer. Please do not ask for more extra credit. There are various assignments to choose from. You can only earn a total of 30 points extra credit.

All Paper Requirements:

- Spelling and capitalization need to be correct
- All papers must have a title page, be typed, double spaced with a 12 pt font
- All pages must have appropriately sized margins.
- All papers must contain information detailed in the procedure section of these guidelines
- Do not turn in papers you have turned in for a previous class.
- Make sure you "INSERT PAGE BREAK" before your works cited page

Turnitin: All papers will be submitted to Turnitin. Please check your similarity report, this flags plagiarism. Also, Turnitin now checks to see if your paper was written by Artificial Intelligence, you will not see this percentage, but your instructor will. Any percentage of Artificial Intelligence usage will result in a zero for your paper.

Due Dates: All due dates are listed in D2L. Please also utilize the calendar in D2L.

Make-Up Policy: There will be **NO** makeup tests or quizzes given. You are given dates for exams in advance. Please make every effort to be in class on that day as I will not give a make up. Essays and other papers are available for several weeks, you should be working on them and not wait until the last minute. I will not give extensions on any papers as they are available for weeks. Late work will not be accepted.

If you have issues with an assignment you need to see me **BEFORE** the assignment is due. I cannot help you if you contact me after the assignment is due.

If you have issues with the grade on an assignment **DO NOT** wait until the end of the semester to say something. I will not go all the way back to look at those assignments
