Students are encouraged to consider coming to office hour every week to get extra guided practice with the material. Office hour is also a convenient time to complete quiz make-ups following an absence, quiz re-dos, and grade checks. Office hour scheduling will be determined through a class survey. You can also email me to set up a meeting if the office hour time doesn't work for you.

Required Textbook/Materials: There is no required textbook for this course. You are, however, required to have a music composition notebook.

Recommended Textbook/Materials:

Fein, E. (2020) *Inner hearing: The systematic and progressive approach to sight singing*. King of Prussia: Presser. ISBN: 1-49113-297-3.

Please buy the recommended textbook, *Inner Hearing* online if possible. You can buy it online for less than \$30 including shipping. I will provide a copy of the rhythm method book by William Horne to each of you. You will need to bring these three items to class each period: the Fein book, the Horne book, and a music staff notebook. Often, I will provide additional sheets to read from, but students are *not* required to keep these.

Course Description: This course is required for music majors. Singing more difficult tonal music in various clefs, aural study including dictation of more complex rhythm, melody, chromatic harmony, and extended tertian structures. Concurrent enrollment in MUSI 2311 is required. Prerequisite: MUSI 1117 with a grade of "C" or better.

Course requirements: In this skills-based course, requirements will be the completion of oral midterm and final exams, performance in daily quizzes, and attendance at all class meetings.

Welcome!

I'm Ms. Carmichael, and I'll be your instructor in this course. Sight singing and ear training courses will play a critical role in your musical development. I hope to provide you with the methods and opportunities needed to succeed in this area.

Class material:

Rhythm. We will spend just 1-2 class periods practicing each rhythm exercise in the Horne book before quizzing on it. They are very difficult, so make sure you're actively practicing. Each exercise is a duet that you will perform with an assigned partner.

Warm-up. Warm-ups for class may include breath engagement exercises, vocalises, solfege scales/intervals singing, solfege reading, and dictation using solfege. The purpose of the warm-ups is freeing the voice to facilitate vocal ease and tuning, as well as gaining familiarity with solfege, which is the chosen reading method for this class.

Sight singing. We will spend a week on each Fein chapter. The beginning of each chapter includes etudes that force students to recreate intervals by ear. The quizzes will be a random selection of one of the melodic examples at the end of the chapter that you will sing individually for the class. Dictation. Every class period will include a dictation exercise focused on hearing various aspects of melody, rhythm, or harmony. Material on dictation quizzes will follow the type of dictation we last practiced in class.

Class rules:

- o No excessive talking or joking around, and no tangents that take the class off track.
- o No cell phone usage during class. If you need to use your cell phone, please step out of the room. A student who looks at their phone during class will have a Late added to their attendance record, which eventually affects their attendance grade.
- o No chewing gum or eating once the clock strikes 11:00 AM.

Expectations:

- o Students will practice sufficiently for each upcoming quiz.
- O Students will reach out to the professor or someone else whenever they aren't able to sufficiently prepare for an upcoming quiz.
- o Students will submit their missed quizzes after an absence via email or in person.
- Students will email the professor when they will be absent or late, or have been absent or late.

Late Work, Make-Up, and Extra-Credit Policy:

Make-ups:

When a student is absent, they know they have received a zero for the quiz that day, as there is a quiz every day. Missed quizzes can be made up for full credit. There are two ways to complete make-ups. Students can either email me an audio recording of the missed quiz, or they can perform the quiz in person at my office hour. Even if you are very late submitting your make-up quizzes, I strongly prefer you do so rather than accept the zeros. Please communicate with me when you have questions about submitting make-up work. (I want you to get an A.)

Note: If you are absent on a day with a dictation quiz, I will email you an audio recording of the material for you to complete at home.

Quiz Re-Dos:

If you are unhappy with your performance on a recent quiz, you are more than welcome to demonstrate to me that you can do it better. You can send an audio recording of the quiz via email or perform the quiz in person for me at office hour. If you do this, your grade on the quiz will be raised accordingly.

Attendance Policy:

Absence:

It is my expectation that students will email me when they are going to be absent or when they have just been absent. The email does not have to include why you are absent. It merely informs me that you intend to continue maintaining good standing in the class.

Attendance is very important in this skills-based course. Attendance at each class meeting is recorded and graded. Students will receive an attendance grade at midterm and a second one at the final. Attendance overall is worth 10% of the final grade. Every class is worth .3125% of the total final grade.

Tardiness:

If you are planning to be more than a few minutes late, I appreciate notification via email (that way, I can wait to do the quiz until you've arrived).

'Lates' themselves are not counted against your grade, but four lates translate to an absence. There are two attendance grades in the semester, one at midterm and one at final. Your accumulated tardies do not roll over into the second half of the semester, so after midterm you receive a fresh start.

Communicating with your instructor: ALL electronic communication with the instructor must be through your COM email. Due to FERPA restrictions, faculty cannot share any information about performance in the class through other electronic means.
