ENGL 1302 Course Catalog

Description: Intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for developing research-based expository and persuasive texts. Emphasis on effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical reading of verbal, visual, and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions.

Attendance Policy: Because this is an online class, your attendance will be recorded based on logging into our Brightspace course shell and viewing/completing weekly requirements. Please be mindful of the importance of every assignment/discussion post in this class. <u>Failure to complete required work for 1 full week may result in being dropped from the course</u>. If not dropped, it more than likely will result in you failing the course.

A Note on the 3-Week Course Format: The shift from the 8-week format to the 3-week means that you will learn more material in less time and be expected to complete work in less time. This also means that my expectations of you are heightened. My biggest hope is that you do not give up or doubt your capabilities, even if it feels to be too much at first. I am your resource, and I want you to succeed but it first starts with you believing in yourself and taking yourself seriously. Never hesitate to ask questions as they arise. Remember that sometimes learning means not knowing at first.

Course Requirements/Unit Overview:

Weekly HW (other than major assignments): Your completion of weekly HW is crucial not only to your success, but it is also a way for me to assess whether or not you are engaging with the learning material. Outside of the major assignments, HW includes keeping up with weekly VoiceThreads, watching weekly videos, listening to podcasts, reading assigned materials, watching TV shows/films, and posting multiple VoiceThread comments per week and/or responding to peers.

Week/Unit 1: Understanding + Contributing to Social Discourse

Our first lesson in this class will be centered on the idea that active reading involves social discourse. Before that though, you must learn how to understand what you are reading. We will actively go through this process together with particular scholarly articles and readings.

You will be completing this essay as proof that you have successfully understood how to find scholarly articles, decipher them, and contribute to the conversation.

Week/Unit 2: Rhetoric in Media

Shifting gears from the written word, we will explore other contexts of meaning-making through digital means, such as social media, music, TV shows, and films.

Rhetorical Analysis |Monday 12/23 5am

After learning how to recognize rhetoric and discuss it, you will venture into your own individual rhetorical analysis of any genre that interests you.

Week/Unit 3: Writing and Speaking to the Public Sphere

Once you have learned how to recognize and discuss rhetoric, you will be tasked with communicating an argument about an issue that matters to you through various HW activities that will culminate into your public sphere project.

Public Sphere Project | Thursday 12/26 5am (no extensions)

For this assignment, you will be creating your own 5-15 min podcast segment (or a different, approved modality) related to an issue that matters to you. Your audience will be the general public. Alongside the process of crafting your project, you will write a paper contextualizing and situating it in the scope of the material you have learned in this class, outside sources that surround the conversation, and your take on its applicability to the public sphere. By the time this assignment comes around, I hope that you will feel empowered through understanding that an argument can be anything, and most certainly, can be something you are passionate about.

Late Work Policy: Timely completion of all assignments is crucial. Please know that not completing an assignment sets you back, especially with the time crunch of a 3-wk model. It is in your best interest to complete every assignment on time with full effort. **Late or incomplete assignments will not receive extensive feedback.**

- Late Assignments: Assignments submitted within 48hr of the original due date will receive a deduction of up to 2 full letter grades.
- **Missed Assignments:** Assignments that are not submitted within 48hr of the original due date are missed assignments that will receive a zero.
 - <u>Please note that you must complete all major assignments in order to</u> <u>pass the course. Thus, 1 missed assignment = F</u>
- **Incomplete Assignment**: Assignments submitted on time or within the 2-day submission period that do not meet one or multiple requirements are considered incomplete and will receive a zero until the student completes the assignment fully. An incomplete assignment suggests that you are either (1) not reading the assignment sheet and watching the VoiceThread where I go over instructions, or (2) you are not being proactive and asking for help.
 - Two incomplete assignments = subject to a full letter grade deduction on the end-of-semester average
 - All incomplete assignments (as in all 3 of the major assignments) = F
 - NOTE: You may not submit an incomplete public sphere project since the deadline is so close to the grade due date. If you turn in this assignment incomplete, it will either be an automatic failure of the course or you will lose at least a full letter grade worth of points. This will be decided according to my discretion and will depend on how close to reaching the level of "complete" the assignment is and the willingness of the student to reach out and ask for help prior to submitting.

24-Hr Late Submission Opportunity (The "Life Happens" Clause):

• You will have **one 24-hr late submission opportunity that you can use either** on major assignment #1 or #2. If you choose to use it, just email me and let me know.

Make-Up Policy (The "Revision" Clause): You have the opportunity to revise assignments #1 and #2 if you receive a grade that you are not happy with. The caveat here is that you must meet with me to go over my feedback and steps for revision. Along with your revised draft, you will be required to submit a mini reflection about what you have done to revise the assignment and what you have learned in the process. It is always best to notify me early if you want to revise; this allows ample time to complete your revision and submit it with enough time for me to grade it before grades are due.

A Note on Written Feedback: You will receive feedback from me on major assignments. If I ever give you feedback that you do not understand, please please reach out and we can set up a time to go over it. I understand that you cannot improve if you do not understand the advice I am giving. Help me help you \bigcirc If you submit an assignment late, please do not expect extensive feedback.

Extra Credit Opportunities: There are no extra credit opportunities in this class because I give each of you the opportunity to revise major assignments 1 and 2 after you meet with me. In other words, you earn points back by recognizing where you can improve your writing and working to do so.

Important Course Info

VoiceThread: For this course, we will be using a platform called VoiceThread, which I often refer to as VT. VT is an instructional platform that is free to you and will contain all the weekly instructional material + post prompts/deadlines. See more about it <u>here</u>. I will use your COM email to set up your account to ensure you have full basic account abilities. You should receive an email about this prior to Week 1. It is important to tune in to the VT of the week on Monday to ensure you are aware of your due dates for the week.

Setting up your Notifications on Brightspace: In order to receive an email of the announcements that I post on Brightspace, you need to change your notification settings. In order to do this, follow these steps:

- Click on your name in the top right corner of Brightspace
- Click on Notifications
- Click "Enable email notifications"
- Make sure that the "new announcement available" section has a checkmark underneath the email column

You can set the same thing up for text messages. The only difference is that the text message will not send you the full announcement; it will only send you a notification that a new announcement has been posted on Brightspace.

I will post a Brightspace tutorial during Week 1 going over this. In short, you can find my announcements on the Homepage. Everything else can be accessed directly from the content tab, including links to VoiceThread, readings, and submission links.
