#### **Required Textbook/Materials:**

Getlein, M and Donahue-Wallace, K. 2024. *Living with Art*, 13th ed. Columbus, OH; McGraw Hill.

**Course Description:** A general introduction to the visual arts designed to create an appreciation of the vocabulary, media, techniques, and purposes of the creative process. Students will critically interpret and evaluate works of art within formal, cultural, and historical contexts.

## **Course requirements:**

## Online Exams via Brightspace:

**Four** exams will be administered online in Brightspace/D2L. They may consist of multiple-choice, matching, multiple-selection, and true-false questions. You will have 75 minutes to take the exam. The "What's due when?" document lists the exams' due dates.

#### Online Quizzes via Brightspace:

There will be **five** online quizzes in Brightspace. Each quiz consists of 5 multiple-choice questions. You will have 20 minutes to take the quiz. The "What's due when?" document lists the quiz's due dates.

#### Online Assignment via Brightspace:

There will be **three** online assignments. The "What's due when?" document lists the due dates for each assignment.

#### Online Discussion via Brightspace:

Four online discussions will be held. The "What's due when?" document lists the discussions' due dates.
