Communication

Quiz and Exam grades will be posted immediately to your Grade Center, and grades for Writing Assignments and Discussion Forums will generally be update on Mondays and Fridays.

Participation

You are expected to log into the course a <u>minimum of 5 times per week</u> and you should expect to spend at least 5-6 hours a week in the course reviewing lessons and other course material.

The discussion component of the course requires you to engage your fellow students in "conversation," which requires you to regularly read and respond to posts. Due to the online nature of this course, it is up to the student to provide thoughtful and elaborate responses to discussion posts for the instructor to measure the students' understanding of the material. In addition, any aggressive, rude, degrading, etc., posts may be deleted without notice to the student. All such responses will receive a grade of 0 for the deleted thread.

Please understand that minimal participation will result in minimal points.

Method of Instruction

This course primarily consists of online lessons and discussions provided by the instructor. Additionally, videos and other supplementary articles may be used to emphasize key issues. The online lessons parallel and reinforce assigned readings; therefore it is essential that students keep up to date with their online work. The online lessons will be open for one week, giving you plenty of time to complete the required materials.

Coursework Policy

HOW TO CALCULATE YOUR GRADE during the semester:

(Points Earned / Points Possible) X 10

Example: You have earned 180 out of 200 possible points so far in the class. You would calculate your current numeric grade by dividing 180 by 200 and then multiplying the result by 100:

 $180/200 = 0.9 \times 100 = 90 \Rightarrow$ Your current numeric grade would be 90%. Ultimately your final grade will be based upon the points values found on the previous page.

Course Requirements:

- Syllabus Quiz: This quiz will test you on the information found in the syllabus (50 points).
- **Scavenger Hunt:** This will give you the opportunity to learn about campus resources and how to utilize them (50 points).
- **Study Guides:** For each chapter in your textbook (Chapters 1-7), you are responsible for completing a study guide in the formats specified in the chart below (7 x 25 points each = 175 total points). Information about the study guide formats can be found in the *Appendix* of the textbook.

- Career Project (Parts 1-5): You will initially choose two potential careers to investigate (Part 1; 25 points), which you will then compare and contrast in an effort to pinpoint one career that is a "best fit" for you (Part 2; 25 points). You will consider the role of social responsibility in your chosen career (Part 3; 25 points) and how you will use the information from each of the textbook chapters to be successful in this career (Part 4; 25 points). Finally, you will prepare an oral/visual (video) presentation to share with your peers (Part 5; 100 points).
- **Discussion Board Posts (15):** For each discussion board post assignment, you will choose ONE of the discussion questions indicated from the chapter to respond to (20 points). You must also submit a reply to at least one other student's post (5 points).
- Campus Connections: This assignment will require you to meet with your advisor and either get tutoring OR attend a campus event (100 points).
- **Academic Planning:** You will either investigate a university you want to transfer to OR investigate the next steps to graduating from COM (25 points).
- **Financial Literacy**: You will investigate how to manage money and financial skills (25 points).

Late Work, Make-Up, and Extra-Credit Policy

Late Work & Make-Up Policies: No late work will be accepted but under extreme circumstances, late work *might* be accepted at the discretion of the instructor, *if students contact the instructor as soon as possible (before the deadline)*. Technological issues are not an acceptable excuse for a late assignment.

Extra Credit Policy: Completing the course evaluation will earn you 25 points extra credit if you follow the submission guidelines in D2L.

Assignment Submission: Assignments must be submitted to D2L as .doc/.docx (Word), .pdf, or .jpeg files. It is your responsibility to double-check after submitting an

assignment to ensure the correct document was submitted and in the correct file format, on time (resubmit the correct document immediately, if needed).

Attendance & Classroom Conduct Policies: Although this is an online course, regular "attendance" and participation are critical to being successful. This course is conducted entirely online, which means that you must be diligent about working on assignments to meet the deadlines.

It is expected that everyone treats each other with mutual respect.
