Course Description: The scientific study of human society, including ways in which groups, social institutions, and individuals affect each other. Causes of social stability and social change are explored through the application of various theoretical perspectives, key concepts, and related research methods of sociology. Analysis of social issues in their institutional context may include topics such as social stratification, gender, race/ ethnicity, and deviance. Prerequisite: TSIA2 945-990 ELAR/CRC test AND 5 or higher on Essay OR 910-944 on CRC with 5-6 on Diagnostic Test + 5 or higher on Essay, or [IRW 0320](#) with a grade of "C" or better.

Course requirements: The basic structure of this class is a lecture class carried out in a face-to face manner which means that students enrolled in the class must attend all face-to-face classes. Course requirements include:

- *2 Group PPP Assignments –20% of final grade),
- *1 Research Paper and PPP- 20 % of final grade,
- *2 essay exams - 20% of final grade,
- *Final Essay Exam– 40% of final grade
