**ENGL 1301 Course Description:** The course is an intensive study of and practice in college-level academic reading and writing processes. We will practice moving from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. We will emphasize effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Finally, we'll focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis.

#### **Course Requirements:**

**Attendance/Timeliness/Participation:** Attendance and arriving on time to class is crucial to your success not just in this class but in life. As a result, these categories will be factored into your grade. Participation pertains to any work we do in class that may not fall under the other categories.

**Quizzes:** Throughout the semester, you can expect quizzes scattered throughout as my way of gauging your understanding of the material that we are covering. These will be brief quizzes that can range from multiple choice to short written responses. These will be completed during class and will be paper-based. This means if you are absent, you will receive a zero and you will have one week to make up the quiz during our next class and/or during my office hours. I will always let you know ahead of time when to expect a quiz and what material will be on it.

#### Journal | Due Wednesday 12/13

This semester you will be required to maintain a physical or virtual journal that you will submit at the end of the semester. The purpose of this is to document your journey during the semester. There is no requirement in terms of what you need to write about. In fact, I will not even read this journal unless you give me permission. The only thing I will be checking at the end of the semester is that you have completed at least 2 entries per week (a total of 32). Your first assignment for this class will be the first entry of your journal. This grade will count as a major assignment (100 points).

#### Weekly/Major Assignments | Sundays 11:59pm

Weekly assignments will consist of activities and will all work toward understanding the unit that we are in and/or help you progress on major assignments. Major assignments are weighted on a 100 point scale versus "mini" assignments that are weighted on a 20- or 50-point scale. You will receive significant guidance as you work towards these assignments.

#### Midterm | October 23 / Final Exam | December 11

This semester you will complete a midterm and final exam to test your understanding of the course material. Keep in mind that the quizzes will play a huge part in this content. As long as you are staying up to date with the material, doing well on quizzes, and showing up for review days, you should be successful on these exams. Do not let the names intimidate you! The midterm and the final exam will consist of a multiple choice section and a short answer section.

**Course Grade Determination:** If you complete every assignment and meet the minimum requirements for each (E.g., correct word/page count, follow all given directions, submit on due date, etc.), then you will pass this course. I value effort and ambition the most. Your grade is ultimately a product of the effort that you put forth. I want you to be successful in this course, but like everything in life, I cannot force people to do the things they do not want to do.

**A Note on Written Feedback:** You will receive feedback from me on major assignments. If I ever give you feedback that you do not understand, please please reach out and we can set up a time to go over it. I understand that you cannot improve if you do not understand the advice I am giving. Help me help you  $\bigcirc$  If you submit an assignment late, please do not expect extensive feedback.

Late Work/Make-Up Policy: Timely completion of all assignments is crucial. Timeliness is an aspect of responsibility and an expectation in most areas of life. Only timely submissions will receive feedback from me on how to improve. Should you, for some reason, not be able to turn in an assignment on time, you will have one 24-hr late submission opportunity that you can utilize. Anything else submitted late will lose a letter grade after each late day has passed. After 2 days of the due date, you will no longer be able to submit your work and your grade for that assignment will remain a zero. There are no extensions for the journal, quizzes, the midterm, or the final.

If you are going to be absent, it is your responsibility to let me know and ask for the materials of the day. If you are absent, you have until the end of that week to complete the daily assignment for the day you missed. If you missed a weekly quiz, you will have to make this up in class the following week. The only makeups not possible are the Midterm and the Final Exam.

**A Note on Balancing Life + Academics:** I am aware that, for some, school is one of *many* daily responsibilities. Because of this, I have designed this course with built-in "work days" to not only work on upcoming major assignments, but to receive feedback from myself and your peers. Please take advantage of these days and show up ready to work.

#### **Extra Credit Opportunities:**

\*More opportunities might come up randomly throughout the semester

- Each week, there will be an opportunity to post in a discussion post for all of your classmates to see. For every discussion you participate in, you can receive 1 extra credit point. These extra credit points will be tallied up at the end of the semester and go toward your lowest assignment grade. This extra credit only applies to assignment grades that you completed and does not apply to exams or quizzes.
- Complete and submit ALL assignments/quizzes on time the entire semester receive +2 on your overall average at the end of the semester

**Attendance Policy:** Attendance is required to be successful in this class. I understand things come up. Please communicate with me if you need to miss and I will work with you to get caught up on anything you might miss. Note that no absences are considered excused when it comes to the attendance grade.

There are many types of plagiarism, and you may not be aware of all. A good rule of thumb to live by: Your work should be generated only by you and only for ENGL 1301. If you are not sure if you are violating these rules, please talk to me about it before turning in your work.
