Course Description: A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the pre-Columbian era to the Civil War/Reconstruction period. United States History I includes the study of pre-Columbian, colonial, revolutionary, early national, slavery and sectionalism, and the Civil War and Reconstruction eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History I include American settlement and diversity, American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, and creation of the federal government

Course requirements:

Exams: There will be **four exams** during the semester with a value of **100** points each, 50 points for a Multiple-Choice portion, 50 points for the Essay portion. Exam material will be drawn from quizzes, assigned readings, D2L/Brightspace assignments and all class activities. Students should pay particular attention to terms in the study guides, which will be available on D2L at the beginning of the module. Each exam may consist of multiple-choice questions, short answers, and map questions

Core Objective: Critical Thinking

Essay Exams: There will be **four essay exams** during the semester, these are in addition to the multiple-choice exams you will take in class. Essay Exams will be available from the beginning of a Module, so you will have several weeks to work on these essays. The instructions for the

essays will be on D2L. Utilizing the COM Tutoring Center is for your benefit, but for these exams it will be 10 points extra credit.

Assessment Quizzes: In addition to the four exams, there will be at least 10 quizzes in Blackboard to assess your progress between major exams. Quizzes will count for a total of 100 points (10 points for each quiz). Like exams, quizzes cannot be made up. Missed quizzes receive a grade of zero. Quizzes address the following Core Objective: Critical Thinking.

Textbook Readings, Videos, Podcasts and Lessons will all include information that will be on quizzes and exams. These will open each week with the appropriate material.

Discussion Board: There will be 5 Discussion Board entries. Initial posts need to be at least 100 words and have a thorough discussion of the topic question presented. Students must respond to at least two other posters for full credit. Each discussion board post is worth 20 points. Please review the discussion board etiquette in D2L Brightspace.

Movie Critique: I have a list of suggested movies on D2L Brightspace. Choose a film appropriate for our class. After watching the movie, you will write a two-page typed paper about the film. You will address the question of how this movie/documentary fits into the class discussions we have had. Is this an accurate representation of what we have been studying? See course schedule for due date. Upload your finished paper to D2L Brightspace.

Movie Critique (50 points)

- You need to look for movies on the approved movie list posted on Blackboard. If you want to do a movie on the list, you must get approval from your instructor or you risk receiving a zero.
- After watching the movie, you will write a 2-page typed paper about the movie. You will address the question of how this movie fits into the class discussions or your knowledge of the time-period/event. Is this an accurate representation of what we have been studying? Why or why not
- You need to go into detail about this film.
- First give a summary of the film.
- Then, discuss in detail how it fits into the class discussions or your knowledge of the time period or event.
- Is it an accurate representation of what we have been studying? Why or why not, give details.
- This is not just a summary of the movie you need to analyze the movie.
 DO NOT USE OTHER SOURCES FOR THIS ASSIGNMENT. ONLY USE THE MOVIE ITSELF.
- I don't want to know what the critics think. I don't want to know how much it made. You need to use only the movie itself.

• You may go longer than 2 pages, but your paper needs to be detailed. Do not imply and expect me to know what you mean.

Research Paper: Each student will write a 5-page research paper over a topic in US History from 1492-1877. This paper should be in a research paper format and NO LESS than 5 pages, a works cited page should be included. Follow MLA formatting guidelines, including citations and a works cited page. Paper must be double spaced Times New Roman font, 12 pt. Please review rubric for grading criteria. Before you write your paper, post your topic on the appropriate discussion board. This is to make sure you choose a topic that falls into the scope of this class. If you do not post in the discussion board and get your topic approved, you risk receiving a zero for the paper. You must use at least 3 sources (no textbooks of any kind). You will also be required to use the COM Tutoring center to receive feedback for your paper. This will be 15 points of your paper grade. Your paper is 50 points and tutoring is 15 points for a total of 65 points. Students will be required to turn in a Paper proposal which will include the thesis statement and sources you plan to use. The proposal is worth 25 points and detailed instructions are on D2L Brightspace.

Oral Presentations: Each student will create an oral presentation over the topic that you wrote your research paper on. You will not read the paper but give a presentation telling us what you learned about the subject. Students will follow the directions in D2L for recording their video. The presentations should be 3-5 minutes long.

Responsibility Paper: Students will pick a person or movement that fits into the time period of HIST 1301 – U.S. History to 1877. Students will write a two-page typed paper on the Social and Personal Responsibility of the subject. The student must include a paragraph in their paper discussing the social and personal responsibility of the individuals involved. Students will use **primary and secondary** sources for their paper. You must include a works cited. You will also be required to use the COM Tutoring center to receive feedback for your paper. This will be 15 points of your paper grade. Your paper is 50 points and tutoring is 15 points for a total of 65 points

Covers: Critical Thinking, Social Responsibility, Personal Responsibility, Communication

Example Topic: Harriet Tubman's decision to help runaway slaves, what are the consequences of her actions? What personal responsibility does she have and how does it influence those around her? What social responsibility does she have and how does it influence those around her?

All Paper Requirements:

- Spelling and capitalization need to be correct
- All papers must have a title page, be typed, double spaced with a 12-pt. font
- All pages must have appropriately sized margins.
- All papers must contain information detailed in the procedure section of these guidelines

• Do not turn in a paper you have used for another class
