Required Textbook: We will be using a free, open-source electronic textbook found at https://openstax.org/details/books/us-history.

Course Description: A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the Civil War/Reconstruction era to the present. United States History II examines industrialization, immigration, world wars, the Great Depression, Cold War and post-Cold War eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History II include American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, urbanization and suburbanization, the expansion of the federal government and the study of U.S. foreign policy.

Course requirements:

Readings/Textbook/Lectures: It is imperative that you keep up with the textbook reading assignments and any additional reading assignments posted on the course website. **READ BEFORE WATCHING THE LECTURES!** All of the readings and the lectures will complement each other. While there may be some overlap of information, you will not be able to effectively answer the exam questions if you have not kept up with all of the course materials. During lectures you need to take copious and detailed notes to review prior to exams. Pay close attention to the different themes in the course. While factual details are very important, you will

need to be able to provide a critical analysis of the major themes in the interpretation of U.S. History.

Course Website: We will use D2L Brightspace as our course website. You will find the syllabus and other important documents posted on the site. You will submit all of your assignments through D2L Brightspace. Your grades will be posted on D2L Brightspace. Class e-mail and announcements will be sent through D2L Brightspace. Please feel free to utilize the discussion board feature to arrange study groups or clarify course materials with other students. DO NOT abuse this feature. The instructor monitors the site and anyone using it inappropriately will have their usage privileges revoked.

Syllabus: You MUST read the entire syllabus. Most student questions can be answered by reading this syllabus. Assignment due dates are also contained in the syllabus.

Introductory Assignments: There are two (2) introductory assignments found in Module A, Week one. Follow instructions given on how to communicate via instant message, email, and the discussion board feature of course website. Proper and timely compliance of those instructions will be worth a total of 25 pts.

Personal Responsibility Assignment: Students will write an essay on personal responsibility and college. Full instructions are found in the assignments for Week 1. It is worth 25 points, 2.5% of total course grade. The Personal Responsibility Assignment addresses the following Core Objective: Personal Responsibility.

Documentary Film Assignments: Students will be asked to watch four documentaries and fill in a study guide while watching. They will then type up their answers and save as a Word doc to be submitted in an assignment drop box. The documentaries will be worth 50pts each, total points: 200, for 20% of course grade. The video links and study guides are in the module assignments. This assignment addresses the Core Objective: Critical Thinking.

Weekly Chapter Assignments: Each week you will have a short assignment that applies to the textbook chapters for that week. The assignments will vary in type and point value. Each on will be worth between 5 and 25 points to total at least 100 points, 10% toward the overall course grade. The actual total point value will be more than 100 as I have built in extra points to cover a missed assignment or too and to provide some built-in extra credit. These assignments will also count as being "present" that week in class for college records of attendance. Weekly Chapter Assignments address the following Core Objective: Critical Thinking Skills.

Exams: There will be four (4) module exams given in this course. Exam material will be drawn from both lectures in each module and assigned readings from the textbook. Students should print the exam questions at the start of each module and work on them as you progress through the textbook, lectures, and any additional course materials such as documentaries and additional assignments. Each exam will consist of several writing prompts. Each prompt will need to be addressed. Each exam is worth 100 points for a total of 400 points (40% of course grade). An Optional/Make-up Exam will be offered the last week of the course. This exam can be used to replace a missed exam or one with a low grade (if you score higher on the optional exam than

one of the 4 regular exams, I will substitute the higher grade for the lower one.) Exams address the following Core Objectives: Critical Thinking Skills and Communication Skills 1.

Social Responsibility Assignment: Students will read about the World Doomsday Clock and write a reflective essay on it and discuss what our social responsibility is as a global community. This assignment will be turned in through an assignment drop box and is worth 50 points, 5% of total course grade. The Social Responsibility Assignment addresses the following Core Objective: Social Responsibility.

Group Timeline Project: There will be one course research project. Students will divide into groups to work together (remotely via D2L Brightspace, or you may choose to meet up in person) and independently on creating an interactive timeline. The project will consist of event choices, image choices, descriptive text, and audio presentation applied to Timeline. Progress reports and peer assessments will also be a portion of the project grade. The project will be broken down into stages with different due dates. The project will be worth a total of 200 points (20% of your total course grade). The Group Timeline Project addresses the following Core Objectives: Critical Thinking Skills, Communication Skills 1,2, & 3.

Late Work and Make-up Policy: Due dates will be strictly adhered to. The instructor reserves the right to decline make-up work or accept make-up work with penalties on an individual basis. The only exception is the make-up/optional exam (refer to Exams for explanation).

Extra Credit Work: You will have multiple opportunities at extra credit work. There will be a 100 point cap on extra credit points.
