
Course Description: A study of the psychology of learning, cognition, and motivation; factors affecting life-long learning; and application of learning strategies in college, career, and life.

HOW TO CALCULATE YOUR GRADE: (Points Earned / Points Possible) X 10 **Example:** You have earned 180 out of 200 possible points so far in the class. You would calculate your current numeric grade by dividing 180 by 200 and then multiplying the result by 100: $180/200 = 0.9 \times 100 = 90 \rightarrow$ Your current numeric grade would be 90%

- **Scavenger Hunt:** In your Success Teams, you will physically visit various sites around campus and learn about resources offered (100 points; see pgs. 7-8).
- **Study Guides:** For each chapter in your textbook (Foundations, Habit 1, Habit 2, Habit 3, Habit 4, Habit 5, Habit 6, Habit 7), you are responsible for completing a study guide in the formats specified in the chart below (8 x 25 points each = 200 total points).

- **Career Project (Parts 1-5):** You will initially choose two potential careers to investigate (Part 1; 25 points; see pg. 9), which you will then compare and contrast in an effort to pinpoint one career that is a "best fit" for you (Part 2; 25 points; see pg. 10). You will consider the role of social responsibility in your chosen career (Part 3; 25 points; see pg. 10) and how you will use each of the 7 *Habits* to be successful in this career (Part 4; 25 points; see pg. 10). Finally, you will prepare an oral/visual presentation to share with your peers (Part 5; 100 points; see pg. 11).
- **Team Habit Presentation:** Each Success Team will be assigned a chapter from which you will work together to prepare a presentation and "teach" the class (150 points; see pg. 13).
- **Campus Connections:** Students must attend an advising appointment, participate in a tutoring opportunity, attend a campus event, and write a letter to future PSYC 1300 students (100 points; see pgs. 14-15).
- Class Participation: See Attendance Policy for more details (pg. 4).

Assignment Submission & Extra Credit Policies: Assignments must be submitted to D2L as .doc/.docx (Word), .pdf, or .jpeg files. It is good practice to double-check after submitting an assignment (resubmit the correct document if needed). It is ultimately your responsibility to submit work in the proper format on time. Extra credit opportunities will be available on D2L.

Late Work & Make-Up Policies: Assignments submitted after the deadline will incur a 10% deduction per day late (e.g., 2.5 points will be deducted each day for a late study guide). At 10 days late, assignments will become an automatic zero. If for any reason the college closes, continue to work on the assignments as instructed in your syllabus and on D2L. In the event of illness or emergency, late work may be accepted at a reduced or no penalty at the discretion of the instructor, *if students contact the instructor as soon as possible (preferably before the deadline)*. Technological issues are not an acceptable excuse for a late assignment. Late work will NOT be accepted after Tuesday, July 2nd - no exceptions.

Attendance & Classroom Conduct Policies: Regular attendance and participation are critical to being successful in this course. The Class Participation grade accounts for 250 points or 25% of your total grade and is dependent on you attending class and <u>actively participating</u> in class activities and discussions. Generally, Class Participation cannot be made up for any reason, including being sick or for emergencies (there may be exceptions for specific graded assignments such as the Scavenger Hunt). However, students may miss up to two class days without penalty; after two missed class days, each additional absence or lack of participation in a class day will incur a 25-point deduction from the total Class Participation grade (i.e., 12 or more absences = 0 for the Class Participation grade). Additionally, four or more tardies throughout the course will also incur a 25-point deduction. If you miss class, you are responsible for checking the syllabus and learning the content on your own and/or reaching out to the instructor about assignments that were completed or submitted during class.

It is expected that everyone treats each other with mutual respect. Students demonstrate respect to their instructor by arriving on time, staying for the duration of class, participating in class discussion and activities, and listening attentively while the instructor is speaking. The instructor will demonstrate respect to students by arriving on time, being prepared with quality learning materials and activities, and listening attentively while students are speaking. Class discussions may include sensitive topics. It is ok to disagree with others, but it is not ok to verbally attack another person.

Communicating With Your Instructor: ALL electronic communication with the instructor must be through your COM email. Due to FERPA restrictions, faculty cannot share information about performance in the class through other electronic means. Students are expected to check their COM email and D2L course page regularly. Communicate with your instructor in a timely manner so that your instructor can best help you. Your instructor should respond within 24-48 business hours.

Academic Dishonesty: Plagiarism includes, but is not limited to, deliberately copying word-for-word another person's work without proper quotation and attribution (direct plagiarism), submitting your own work from another class (self-plagiarism), and failing to correctly cite sources or unintentionally using the same words as another source without proper quotation and attribution (accidental plagiarism). Academic dishonesty also includes unauthorized use or attempted use of material, information, devices/technology (e.g., Artificial Intelligence), or communication during an academic exercise (i.e., assignment, paper). Any form of academic dishonesty may result in a reduction of points (up to a zero with no make-up) at the discretion of the instructor. Additionally, an academic dishonesty report may be filed.

Career Project Part 2 (25 points) Submit in D2L

Be thorough and provide details from the Occupational Outlook Handbook as well as other sources. Conclude with a paragraph stating how the career you chose is the best fit for you. Your paper should be at least three paragraphs.

- ¶ 1: Introduction (explain what two careers you are considering and why)
- ¶ 2: Second career choice (describe pros & cons and explain why you didn't choose this career)
- ¶ 3: Chosen career (describe the pros & cons and explain why you chose this career)

Career Project Part 3 (25 points) Submit in D2L

Team Habit Presentation (150 points)

Each Success Team is required to develop a presentation on an assigned chapter/habit from the textbook. This will allow each student to get a unique perspective of the teaching/learning process. All team members must have a speaking part in the presentation to earn credit. No student(s) should dominate the presentation.

Include the following components in the presentation:

- 1. Working together, identify the main learning points of the chapter. Each student should complete a detailed **Study Guide** in one of the assigned formats and submit it when completed. Do not move forward with this assignment until everyone in your team has submitted their individual study guide.
- 2. Refer to your completed study guide and create a **PowerPoint** presentation that allows each student in the class to gain insight into the course material. Your PowerPoint should be short, bulleted words/phrases. You will use the PowerPoint as a guide. You will elaborate on the bullet points in your presentation. Become an expert on your habit.
- 3. Have a <u>minimum</u> of one in-class **game** to help strengthen the material. Be creative! You must describe how this activity relates to your habit in your presentation.
- 4. Choose one **activity** from the chapter to have the class complete and discuss.
- 5. Find a **TED Talk** or instructor-approved video pertaining to your topic to show to the class. (20-minute max). You may show two clips adding up to no more than 20 minutes.
- 6. Go to <u>https://collegeinfogeek.com/</u> and find helpful topics such as reading tips, writing tips, memorizing study materials, test taking tips, morning routines, habits, increasing energy/focus or productivity or pick any topic related to your habit. Do not show the clip or article to the class. You will summarize and elaborate on the information you gather.
- 7. **Optional:** include the following topic in your presentation and relate it to your habit. Habit 4-<u>love languages</u>, Habit 5-<u>body language meanings</u>, Habit 6-<u>cultural differences</u> around the world when interacting with others, Habit 7-preventing alzheimer's
