Course Description: ENGL 1301. COMPOSITION I (LECTURE 3, LAB 0). CREDIT 3. AGCM.

Intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating and critical analysis. Prerequisites: One of the following TSI scores combinations or equivalent developmental courses (1) TSI Reading 351 and TSI Writing 350 and TSI Essay 5 (2) TSI Reading 351 with TSI Writing 363 and Essay 4 (3) TSI Reading 351 and TSI Writing less than 350 with ABE 4 and TSI Essay 5.

Course requirements:

This course is collaborative in nature. You will participate in discussions, class activities, and peer review. You will take scheduled quizzes, present in front of the class, and use class time to work on your writing projects.

Milestones Projects, Scholarly Discussion, & Grading Formula

This course is divided into four units of study:

30% Unit 1: Our Writing Lives

This unit focuses on writing within your future professional career. During this unit, you will participate in two short term group projects and presentations and complete two Milestone Writing Projects (one of which you will present in class):

- 15% Group Presentation: Write a Professional Email
- 40% Milestone 1-1: Career Writing Research Presentation
- 15% Group Presentation: Procedures
- 30% Milestone 1-2: Resume

10% Unit 2: Through the Looking Glass

This unit focuses on critical thinking skills with special attention to analysis. During this unit, you will complete two Milestone Writing Projects. The Consumer Analysis is designed to help you see real-world connections. The Literary Analysis is designed to prepare you for academic writing.

- 30% Milestone 2-1: Consumer Analysis
- 70% Milestone 2-2: Literary Analysis

40% Unit 3: Making an Argument

During this unit, you will work as a scholar by researching the debate surrounding artificial intelligence (AI), engaging in discussion, and writing an argumentative essay. There are two Milestone Writing Projects for this unit.

- 20% Milestone 3-1: Preliminary Thesis, Works Cited, Outline
- 80% Milestone 3-2: Argumentative Essay Signature Assignment

05% Unit 4: Continue the Writing Journey

During the final week of the course, you will create a video reflecting on your experiences this semester and setting future goals.

- 100% Milestone 4-1: Self-Reflection Video Essay

Personal Responsibility

Attendance & Timeliness

Attendance in a face-to-face class (F2F) means **showing up on time** for every class and **staying until class is dismissed**. Attendance is mandatory and roll is taken at the start of class. If you come into class after attendance is taken, you will be counted as late. **Timeliness** has a major impact on your Personal Responsibility grade. If you leave early without approval, you will be marked as Left Early on the attendance which will effect your Timeliness score on your Personal Responsibility grade. You may not leave early during Writing Workshop because “you can work on it at home”.

Excused absences **require proof** and are **subject to my discretion**. Exceptions include illness with a doctor's note, funeral, or a personal/family emergency.

The following reasons will **not be excused**: work, busy, stressed, travel, slept late, transportation, etc.

 **Communication is crucial**. Please email me ASAP if you must miss class and provide proof of your absence. If you are experiencing a life event that prevents you from attending or showing up on time, you need to come talk to me.

Participation

Participation in a F2F class means carefully reading and viewing all content and assignment instructions, completing all assigned tasks to the best of your ability and in a timely manner, listening and taking notes, and participating in all class activities and discussions.

Professionalism

Professionalism in a F2F class means **respectfully communicating** with your instructor and classmates, listening to lectures and taking notes, turning off your cell phone, and properly using the computers and printer in the room. Additionally, professionalism means **contacting your instructor in a timely manner** to discuss absences, late arrivals, assignments due, concerns, and questions.

Academic Dishonesty: Any incident of academic dishonesty will be dealt with in accordance with college policy and the Student Handbook. Academic dishonesty – such as cheating on

exams is an extremely serious offense and will result in a **grade of zero** on that exam and the student will be referred to the Office of Student Conduct for the appropriate disciplinary action.

Plagiarism: Plagiarism is a very serious offense and is not acceptable in this course.

Copying someone else's words and claiming them as your own is plagiarism.

Paraphrasing, summarizing, or quoting someone else's words without proper citations is plagiarism.

Using someone else's images (still or moving), data, audio, interviews, etc. without proper citations is plagiarism. You may **not** use copyrighted or trademarked images even with citations.

All essays will be submitted to TurnItIn in D2L/Brightspace –a software that checks papers for plagiarism and artificial intelligence (AI).

Do not use AI without instructor permission and guidance. Do not use Grammarly to edit your work (Grammarly contains a generative AI tool that is flagged as plagiarism by TurnItIn). Do not use ChatGPT, Quillbot, or other AI generators, paraphrasing tools, or rephrasing tools for academic essays without instructor permission and guidance. *You may use the style, combo, and grammar tools in ProWritingAid to edit your work; however do not use the Rephrase tool.

Claiming someone else's words as your own (copy/pasting or turning in a borrowed or bought paper) is *completely unacceptable*. Students who blatantly plagiarize will receive a grade of 0 and will be referred to the Office of Student Conduct for the appropriate disciplinary action.

At the instructor's discretion, accidental plagiarism will be dealt with in the following manner: The instructor will counsel the student regarding improper or missing citations. The student will be given an opportunity to revise their work to include the proper citations. The corrected work will receive reduced credit.
