Course Description:

Government 2306 is an introduction to politics and government of the state of Texas. The purpose of this introduction is to acquire knowledge of the basic principles and practices of the state government.

This semester we will study the origins and development of Texas government, the political science of and the origins and development of the state constitution; the idea of separation of powers and checks and balances in state government; the institutions of the legislature, the plural executive, public administration, and the judiciary; public opinion, political parties, and elections; and issues of public policy.

This introductory course will attempt to understand basic questions and problems encountered by political science and political philosophy. These questions emerge from study of the specific practices and institutions of the state government. Instead of abstractions, the questions will emerge from study of concrete institutions.

Course requirements:

- 1. Materials: Chapter powerpoints, oral lectures, and short videos will be posted in the content section of Blackboard for this class.
- 2. Tests: There are four tests covering the required readings and lectures. The tests will be short answer (2 to 3 paragraphs) essay questions. There is a bonus of up to 10 points for a one page essay on any topic related to the material in the tested chapters. It is due on the day of the test.
- 3. Paper: Students must write a three to five page analytical essay on any topic in Texas Government, Politics or Policy. If policy, you can pick a national or international topic like immigration, abortion, death penalty, etc., but you must deal with it from the perspective of Texas. The essay and will be due on midnight Tuesday November 23rd.

Determination of Course Grade:

Tests count 80% of the final grade. The essay paper counts 20%. There is a ten point bonus available for each test if the student writes a one-page paper on some topic in the chapters covered by the test. The paper is due at the time of that test.

Late Work: Late work will be accepted, but the grade will be reduced five points for every day late.

Attendance Policy: I will be able to track attendance by how often the student signs in to the course on Blackboard.
