Course Description: General Psychology is a survey of the major psychological topics, theories and approaches to the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. Prerequisites: TSIA2 945-990 ELAR/CRC test AND 5 or higher on Essay OR 910-944 on CRC with 5-6 on Diagnostic Test + 5 or higher on Essay, or IRW 0320 with a grade of "C" or better. This is an academic transfer course.

^{*}Correct submission of 3 presentation posts is required to pass this course with a C and higher (presentations must meet minimum requirements). The student who does not submit three (3) presentation posts and earn min required points, and yet earns more than 699 points, forfeits the higher grade. Highest final letter grade possible is a D

ALL numbers/points are included in the calculation of a student's numerical score which is connected to a letter grade. A 0 will be entered for assessments not completed. This includes required and extra credit assessments. This indicates to the student, the course professor, and college administrators which coursework was completed, and which was not. All numbers will be added together, even a 0.

When numbers are added together, the result is a SUM! A 0 does not decrease or increase a student's score.

In D2L, the student will see two numbers separated by a line: XX/XXX. At all times, the student is to focus on the first number only. This number is connected to a final letter grade

Example: 50+10+25+75+0+0+50+25+0+10+5+0+25+0+0+100+0+50+0+75+0+10+0+50+25+0+95+0+45+0=720 **points** out of 1085 points offered. **Grade: C**

The student will see 720/1085. Focus on 720! The 1085 has no meaning!

There are 5 modules in PSYC 2301, thus there are 5 benchmarks: after the Orientation Module, after Module 1, after Module 2, after Module 3 and after Module 4-end of course.

As a student completes an assessment, points are earned. Points are added together which results in a sum. This is a "running/current" score that increases each time points are earned. A 0 is a number and does not decrease nor increase one's score.

Once the coursework for the Orientation Module has been evaluated and points posted to D2L: (35)

- The student has a current grade of A if the student has earned 32 points
- The student has a current grade of B if the student has earned 28 points
- The student has a current grade of C if the student has earned 25 points
- The student has a current grade of D if the student has earned 21 points
- The student has a current grade of F if the student has earned 18 or fewer points

Once the coursework for Module 1 has been evaluated and points posted to D2L:

- The student has a current grade of A if the student has earned 249 points
- The student has a current grade of B if the student has earned 221-248 points
- The student has a current grade of C if the student has earned 194-220 points
- The student has a current grade of D if the student has earned 166-193 points
- The student has a current grade of F if the student has earned 165 or fewer points

Once the coursework for Module 2 has been evaluated and points posted to D2L:

- The student has a current grade of A if the student earned 466 and more points

Assessments:

Discussion Assignments (Chapter/topic and attendance) Required (R)

Discussions will take place over course material, articles, and/or videos. To earn points, the student must follow the instructions and the discussion assignment evaluation rubric. The student must respond to the instructor's prompt and reply to a classmate's post. Write in complete sentences, use course required terms with direct quotes, and follow APA format. Use the assigned textbook and/or lecture summary only, unless instructions direct one to use a different source.

- **Response 1-Required:** Reply to all questions/statements made by the course professor. Use the required term(s) in your post these are in bold font. End the response with a question to your classmates that relates to your post.
- **Response 2-Required:** Respond to a post made by a classmate. Begin your response with the classmate's name. Do not write the words "good job or similar language." The goal is to simulate conversation that would take place in the classroom.
- The Discussion Assignment Evaluation Rubric will be used to score this assessment. Review this information prior to submitting responses

• Evaluation Rubric:

 19-20 points (Excellent response): met word count requirement; answered all questions, incorporated required terms definitions into response by using direct quotes, excellent use of course material and correctly applied/followed APA format for in-text citations rules. Review example listed in D2L. Review <u>Purdue OWL</u> website APA formatting rules

- 17-18 points (Above average response) met word count requirements; answered all questions, used required terms, included all definitions of required terms in the post, excellent use of course material and correctly applied (correct examples), did not follow APA format and/or use in-text quotations (no direct quotes). Review Purdue OWL website APA formatting rules
- o **15-16 points: (Average response):** met word count requirements; answered some questions, used some required terms but did not show a understanding of the course material or course assignment; did not follow APA format or use in-text quotations (no direct quotes). Review Purdue OWL website APA formatting rules
- 13-14 points: (Below Average response) responded to the question(s), did not use complete sentences, significant spelling and grammar errors, did not apply course material correctly, did not use direct quotes or follow APA format
- 2-12 points: (Failing response): No connection to course material, failure to follow any prompts; incorrect discussion
- o **1 point:** did not submit the two required responses
- o **O points:** Did not attempt the discussion assignment

NOTE: Responses can be deleted at the discretion of the course professor. Responses will only be deleted if the instructor determines them to be aggressive, rude, degrading, etc. All such responses will receive a grade of 0. Please refer to the Student Handbook for information regarding student conduct and expectations.

Topic/Chapter Quizzes (R):

14 quizzes each worth 10 points. Quizzes will be assigned for each chapter. Each quiz will have 10 questions. Chapter Quizzes may include a combination of true/false, multiple choice, and/or matching questions. Chapter quizzes are untimed with two attempts. The highest score earned on the two attempts will be the student's score. Students will not be given access to a quiz a third time. NO exceptions. All students must complete the online quizzes by the scheduled deadline. Once the quiz has started it must be completed in that session. The student cannot start and stop the quiz. Plan to complete the quiz in one sitting. Find a quiet location, free of interruptions with secure Internet connection. Plan to complete quizzes on a laptop or desktop. Do not attempt quizzes on one's phone.

Presentation Posts:

Each student is required to complete 3 short Presentation Posts. 75 points each. Complete a fourth presentation for extra credit (75 points). Presentation posts offer students the opportunity to examine some of the ethical issues within psychology and identify how each impacts society at the community, state and national level. This presentation allows

students to acknowledge their personal biases and/or stereotypes, and how they can be more informed regarding their future interactions.

Instructions for Module Presentation Posts. Requirements – read the instructions included in D2L and in the syllabus

- 5-8 minute **audio/video** presentation
- Must save file to the COM One Drive and share with the course instructor as well as upload file to D2L to the
 designated link. Instructions on how to do this are included in D2L. If not saved/shared to the COM One Drive,
 the submission will earn .05 points until correctly submitted. The submission will not receive credit as part of
 the requirements for this course. A file that outlines the steps on how to save and share to COM One Drive (via
 Office 365) is located under the Start Here link
- In addition to the audio/video presentation the student must provide a summary of one's presentation which includes references. This must be submitted as a WORD or PPT file (PDF is okay). Must be typed
- Word or PPTX summary must include a References page. This lists the sources used for one's research
- Must use a minimum of 4 sources following APA format. One of which is the course assigned textbook (see syllabus for this information)
 - o Contact the embedded librarian for assistance
- Presentation must follow presentation evaluation rubric (see next page)

Instructions

- 1. Review the chapters offered in the assigned module and choose a topic of interest to you to research and discuss. Should not be a "chapter title." Must be something presented within a chapter
 - a. Introduce the topic/issue
 - b. Present information about the major ideas around this issue/topic (3)
 - c. Present information about the importance of discussing and addressing this issue/topic (3)
 - d. Discuss how this issue/topic impacts society, as well as the benefits of addressing this issue/topic.
- 2. Students must research the selected topic and identify and use at least 4 sources as part of one's presentation. One source must be the assigned course textbook, the other 3 sources must be academic sources peer reviewed. Contact the embedded librarian for assistance with this important assignment. The student must create a synopsis of their research and their sources in Word or PPTX and post to D2L as well as save and share to the COM One Drive. Listing of sources must follow APA format. Review the information at the following website Purdue OWL Website following APA format.
- 3. After one has conducted research on the topic and written about it, develop and record a **5-8 minute** presentation on the topic. The information presented should be based on the research conducted by the student. This is not a summary of an assigned chapter.

The video/audio presentation should reference the sources used. This might be a good time to share the information from the Word/PPT document. Presentations will be evaluated based on Quality of Information and its Organization, Quality of Verbal Communication, and Quality of Non-Verbal Communication, presentation (PPT,

etc.) and the rubric above. **Presentation must not be less than 5 minutes or more than 8 minutes. Submissions that do not meet this requirement will earn a 0.**

4. MP4 is the ideal presentation software. MOV files also work. One must use the audio/video option in D2L to record one's presentation. How? Click on the assignment link and then select the record video option connected with each assignment link. OR contact DE Support (https://de-support.com.edu/requests). See image below for visual tip for audio/video presentations.

Students can use PPTX and post still shots of themselves to each slide if choose this option. Must have an audio recording with the PPTX. See rubric for evaluation if choose not to offer video



Exams: 4 online exams. Each is worth 75 points. Exams may include a combination of true/false, multiple choice, matching, and/or short answer questions. Exams are timed (130 minutes). Students have ONE (1) attempt to complete the exam, with no second attempts. Complete each exam by each respective date. Once a student starts an exam, the student must complete the exam – in one session. Once the time limit hits, the student will have to complete/submit the exam. The student who misses an exam may take a comprehensive final exam to take the place of the missed exam. This takes the place of one exam only. This opportunity is for students who miss an exam. Students will not have the opportunity to take this exam for extra credit (for more points).

NOTE: Once the student has started an exam, the student must complete the exam on in **one timed session.** Do not plan to start the exam and then walk away and then return to the exam. Find a quiet location free of interruptions with a secure Internet connection. Plan to complete the exam on a laptop or desktop. Do not attempt to take the exam on one's phone.

Attendance Policy: Students are counted present only when they complete the designated attendance discussion assignment each week. A week is defined as each 7-day period from Monday to Sunday. Review the Student Handbook regarding your responsibility to "attend class" and be engaged as an active learner.

Late Work/Make-Up Work: Students should strive to complete assigned coursework each week. However, as long as coursework is completed by the module due date, there is no penalty. Students have at least 7 days (more) to complete coursework for each module (not Orientation). This set-up allows the student flexibility. However, if a student finds that they have fallen behind and needs "extra time" to catch up, the student may request a "late pass." Each student is offered a one-time "late pass" no matter the reason. What is a "late pass?" It is a deadline extension. The student must request the "one-time late pass" before each respective deadline. Requests made after the a deadline will not be approved. One can make up some missed points by taking advantage of extra credit offered throughout the course. There is no major make-up at the end of the course or after the course ends. At times, the course instructor may offer an "extension to all students." All extensions have deadlines.

Once a deadline has passed, do not attempt work that has been awarded a score in the D2L. Once a score has been entered into the D2L gradebook, the student's grade will not be changed (unless feedback directs otherwise). Plan to complete coursework before deadline listed on the course calendar for each assessment.

Optional/Extra Credit Assessments

Optional/extra credit assignments may be offered in this course. These are marked as (EC). Follow the instructions carefully. Extra credit quizzes, which are optional, offer the student one attempt only. These quizzes will not be re-opened or reset. Students will not be offered a second attempt. Read the instructions. Extensions do not apply to extra credit assessments.

Communicating with course instructor: ALL electronic communication with the instructor must be through the student's COM email. Due to FERPA restrictions, faculty cannot share any information about performance in the class through other electronic means. When one does send an email, include the course name and number AND section number in one's email. This information is listed at the top of page one (1) of this document and is also listed in D2L. Generally, student emails are responded to M-F(noon) – College business days up to 48 hours after being read. Communication sent on the weekend, on a college holiday, or any other day the college is closed will receive a response when the college

officially reopens for business. Letter grades are not discussed via email. Each point range is connected to a letter grade and this information is shared in this document. Use it as one's guide.
