Course Description: A study of the biological, psychological, and sociological concepts applicable to basic needs of the family including childbearing and neonatal care. Utilization of the nursing process in the assessment and management of the childbearing family. Topics include physiological changes related to pregnancy, fetal development, and nursing care of the family during labor and delivery and the puerperium. (Lecture 1, Lab 2). Credit 2. WECM.

Course requirements:

- 1. **Unit exams (3)**: Assess knowledge and application of incremental course content. The nursing curriculum is meant to build on knowledge learned in prior semesters. Exam content may include questions related to any previously learned content from prior courses. Exams will use multiple choice, multiple answer, and alternative style test questions as indicated to answer NCLEX-PN testing format. The type of remediation will be determined by the grade. See Academic Remediation Policy in Nursing Student Handbook.
- 2. **Comprehensive Final Exam (1):** Assesses overall knowledge and application of complete course content. The final exam will use multiple choice, multiple answer, and alternative style test questions as indicated to follow NCLEX-PN testing format.
- 3. **Benchmark HESI Exam (1): Assesses** overall knowledge and application of complete course content. The standardized final assessment (HESI Benchmark) will use multiple choice, multiple answer, and alternative style test questions as indicated to follow NCLEX-PN testing format.
- 4. **EAQ Quizzes (3)**: Assesses knowledge and application of content integrated within the course. The student will have <u>one</u> attempt to complete each EAQ quiz. Students must complete each required quiz by the due date and time. Failure to submit a quiz by the due date and time will result in a grade of zero (0) for that quiz. The average of all assigned quizzes will be calculated for the final EAQ quiz grade.
- 5. **Sherpath Lessons (8)**: Assesses knowledge and application of selected maternal/fetal content within the course. Students must complete each required lesson by the due date and time. Failure to submit a lesson by the due date and time will result in a grade of zero (0) for that lesson. The average of all assigned lessons will be calculated for the final Sherpath Lesson grade.
- 6. **Remediation:** See Academic Remediation Policy in the Nursing Student Handbook.

- 9. Define critical thinking.
- 10. Discuss why statistics are important and the common terms used in expressing statistical data.
- 11. Compare and contrast a nursing care plan with a clinical pathway.
- 12. Discuss the role of critical thinking in the nursing process and in clinical judgment.
- 13. Examine the importance of documentation as a nursing responsibility.
- 14. Discuss the objectives of Healthy People 2030 as it relates to maternity and pediatric care.
- 15. Describe the role of the community health nurse as a health care provider.

- 12. Identify special needs of the pregnant adolescent, the single parent, and the older couple.
- 13. Apply the nursing process in developing a birth plan.
- 14. Identify the effects of medication ingestion on pregnancy and lactation.
- 15. Review immunization administration during pregnancy.

- 8. Determine appropriate nursing care for the intrapartum patient, including the woman in false labor and the woman having a vaginal birth after cesarean (VBAC).
- 9. Explain common nursing responsibilities during the labor and birth.
- 10. Describe the care of the newborn immediately after birth.

- 15. Identify principles of breast pumping and milk storage.
- 16. Discuss the principles of weaning the infant from the breast.
- 17. Describe techniques of formula preparation and feeding.
- 18. Discuss the dietary needs of the lactating mother.

- 12. Outline the causes and treatment of hemolytic disease of the newborn (erythroblastosis fetalis).

- 14. Describe home phototherapy.
- 15. Discuss the assessment and nursing care of a newborn with macrosomia.
