Course Description:

This course is intended to provide students with a fundamental understanding of government and politics in the United States. My goal for you in this class is to become an informed and critical thinker as well as a participant in American politics. You will also learn about current political debates as well as the 2024 elections to understand the impact of U.S. politics on your life.

Grading Criteria:

Exams: 4 - 1 = 3 X 20 Points Each = 60% (Lowest exam grade will be dropped)

Discussion board Posts: 4 X 5 Points Each = 20%

Reaction Paper: 20%

Communicating with your instructor: ALL electronic communication with the instructor must be through your COM email. Due to FERPA restrictions, faculty cannot share any information about performance in the class through other electronic means.

Course requirements: Students are required to participate in 4 exams, 4 discussions, and write a reaction paper. Please read the instructions below regarding these assignments:

Discussions:

You will also need to participate in (4) discussion boards during the course. In order to receive full credit you will need to make a post of your own in response to the given prompt, as well as replies to at least two of your fellow classmates' posts. Both are required for full credit and must be posted before the closing of the discussion board. There are minimum word counts for each of your posts and replies. Your original post, responding to the prompt, needs to be a minimum of 200 words and must answer each part of the prompt. Each of your two replies to your classmates' posts must be a minimum of 100 words, so you must do more than simply say "I agree" in order to receive credit. The window to participate in these discussion boards will be listed below in the course schedule. If you miss the window in which the discussions are open on D2L you can submit your responses to me via email, up to (7) days after the deadline, but these will be assessed 10% grade deduction. See details below under "Late Work and Make-Up Exams Policy."

• Exams:

This class will consist of four (4) exams, of these, the lowest exam grade will be dropped. Each remaining exam is worth 20% of your total class grade. Each of these will be non-comprehensive, so they will only cover material from those weeks of the course (i.e. Exam 1 covers material from Unit One, Exam 2 covers material from Unit Two, Exam 3 covers material from Unit Three and Exam 4 covers material from Unit Four). Exams will be made available on D2L, under the 'Course Activities' tab in the 'Quizzes' section, for multiple days. Please see the course schedule for availability dates. Each of the exams consists of 25 multiple choice questions, and you only have one attempt for each exam. The exams will be timed, and you have 40 minutes to complete the exam. At the end of this time, you will no longer be able to answer questions, so please be aware of time while taking the exam and make sure to begin your exam at least 40 minutes before it is due. Please note, once you open the exam in D2L the time will begin. You cannot exit the exam and return to it later, the clock continues to run.

• Reaction Paper:

Description

During this course I hope that you will become more aware of the current political events going on in the United States, and around the world, and establish a better base of knowledge for understanding the politics of the nation. This assignment requires you to write a (minimum 1000 words) reaction paper to a particular current event dealing with American politics and government.

You can choose to write your papers on any current events dealing with American politics and government. A few reputable new sources that you can consider (but certainly not the only ones) are:

- The Economist (economist.com)
- BBC (http://www.bbc.com/news/world/us and canada)
- NPR (http://www.npr.org/sections/news/)
- Newspapers: New York Times (nytimes.com), USA Today (usatoday.com), The Wall Street Journal (wsj.com), The Washington Post (washingtonpost.com), The Houston Chronicle (chron.com), etc.
- National News organizations (CNN, NBC, CBS, Fox)

Requirements:

You will need to do three major things in this paper. Each of these are <u>required</u> in the paper and account for substantial portions of the assignment grade:

- The first part of the paper will be a brief summary of the current event <u>in your own words</u>.
 Overreliance on direct quotes from the article will result in deduction, as will using the bulk of the language of the original article with only minor revisions.
- 2. The second part of the paper will be your reaction, this can be a critique of the piece or event, or the significance of the event, simply your perspective on such. This is intended to be your thoughts, thus please use first person.
- 3. The third component of your paper will be relating the current event to course material in some manner (i.e., where does this article fit into the course material).

Formatting:

- The format for the paper can be any writing style that you are familiar with (MLA, APA, Chicago, etc.), however there are a few things that I will require. Paper will be written double-spaced in 12-pt Times New Roman.
- Also, you will need to attach or provide a <u>working link</u> to the original article with your paper.
 You can put the link in your paper as a works cited. If you do not include a working URL link, a 10pt penalty will be assessed.
- Make sure the length of your paper is at least 1000 words, excluding the works cited or references page. Points will be deducted if your paper does not meet this requirement.

Rubric: Please refer to the separate rubric document on D2L for specific values.

<u>Due Date</u>: Please refer to the course schedule found in the syllabus for the due date.

Late Work and Make-Up Exams Policy:

- All assignments need to be turned in on or before their due dates through D2L. Late discussion
 posts will be accepted up to (7) days after their due dates. However, these will be assessed a
 10% grade deduction. For discussion posts, if you miss the window of availability to post, you
 will need to email me your response to the prompt and 2 replies (indicating the students'
 names).
- Make-up exams will only be allowed at the discretion of the instructor. It is the student's
 responsibility to request permission from the instructor to make-up an exam. If no documented
 emergency is provided, a 10% grade deduction will be applied.
- Late submissions of the reaction paper will only be allowed at the discretion of the instructor. It is the student's responsibility to request permission to turn in this assignment after the deadline. If no documented emergency is provided, a 10% grade deduction will be applied.

Attendance Policy: Submitting class assignments on time is essential for success in this course. Students are expected to login to class in D2L on a regular basis. Students' attendance records will be reviewed by the instructor to ensure compliance.

Academic Dishonesty: Any incident of academic policy will be dealt with in accordance with college policy and the Student Handbook. Academic dishonesty is an extremely serious offense that will result in a grade of zero and the student will be referred to the Office of Student Conduct for appropriate discipline action.
