Required Textbook: As this class is highly interactive, no textbook is required.

Course Description: Introduction to American Sign Language including the development finger spelling, vocabulary, basic sentence structure, and Deaf culture/history in preparing individuals to interpret oral speech.

Course requirements (including description of any special projects or assignments):

***Students will need a personal electronic device with internet access. As well, students may be required to complete assignments online, outside of class.

- <u>EdPuzzle</u>- Students will be required to make an account for EdPuzzle. This is a free online resource for students to review vocabulary. All vocabulary will be uploaded and available to review. The following is the link for EdPuzzle:

Students who already have an account will sign in using the code bajgejl. This code is *case sensitive*. Students will select the "I'm a new student" button on the right. Students will sign up using their first name, student email and a password.

- **Blackboard** Please check the email provided to the school (Blackboard email) and grades at least once per week.
 - ***Students <u>WILL</u> be given assignments using the Blackboard system. These assignments will have specific due dates, which will be strictly adhered to. While not all assignments will be done using Blackboard, students need to be aware of and prepared to use Blackboard on a weekly basis. This requires bringing a <u>charged laptop</u> or personal tablet to class <u>daily</u>.***
- Office 365: Office 365 OneDrive is essential to success in this class. Students will be making videos (to use later in later classes or as a personal portfolio) and uploading them

to OneDrive. Students will then create a link to their OneDrive video and post them to Blackboard.

How to upload to one Drive: Sign in to your Office 365 account using you school username and password.

American Sign Language is a visual language, so this course will require a high level of visual attention. As such, students may be asked to turn off and/or put away any electronic devices unless indicated otherwise by the instructor. Failure to adhere to this requirement could result in disciplinary action.

Determination of Course Grade/Detailed Grading Formula (methods of evaluation to be employed to include a variety of means to evaluate student performance):

Course grades are determined based upon the following:

- Student attendance: Students are expected to attend every class as scheduled. Failure to do so will result in a drop in letter grade per absence. As well, lateness will NOT be tolerated. 3 instances of tardiness will also result in a drop of letter grade.
- Student proficiency per assignment (determined by a rubric based upon the American Council of Teachers of Foreign Language guidelines-this will be provided before each assignment)
 - -Each assignment will be graded based upon a rubric developed to fit the assignment. Proficiency will be determined by appropriate situational use and accuracy of interpersonal skills, presentational skills, and interpretive skills.
- Student language use: Students are expected to participate and <u>use American Sign</u>
 <u>Language</u> in every class. Students will be required to present assignments both to the professor and to the class. Failure to participate will result in a drop in grades.

Grading:

1. **Group Presentations** (Presentational Assessments)

- Students will be given nine group presentations throughout the semester. These will count for 15 points each (with one assignment counting double), totaling 150 points toward the overall grade.

2. **Individual Presentations** (Presentational Assessments)

- Students will be given five individual presentations throughout the course of the semester. They will count 30 points each, totaling 150 points toward the overall grade.

3. Individual Videos (Presentational and Interpersonal Assessments)

- Students will be given eight individual video assessments given throughout the semester. They will be worth 25 points each, totaling 200 points toward the overall grade.

4. Interpretive Assessments

- Students will be given two individual interpretive assessments given throughout the semester. They will be worth 25 points each (with one assignment counting double), totaling 75 points toward the overall grade.

5. Interpersonal Assessments

- Students will be given one individual interpersonal assessment given throughout the semester. It will be worth 25 points, totaling 25 points toward the overall grade.

6. Deaf Culture Event

- Students will be required to attend one Deaf event throughout the semester. It will be worth 100 points, totaling 100 points toward the overall grade. **DUE-December 9th by** 11:59

7. Final: Interpersonal, Interpretive, and Presentational Assessment

-Students will be given a 3 part final, totaling 300 points toward the overall grade

-Presentational: totaling 100 points

-Interpretive: totaling 100 points

-Interpersonal: totaling 100 points

Make-Up Policy: Generally, assignments that are late will not be accepted. Students need to contact the professor in the case of special circumstances prior to the due date. Circumstances will be taken into consideration, but will be determined on a case-to-case basis.

Students should also expect to spend one to two hours minimum working and studying additional resources. Further social interaction with d/Deaf persons will also likely improve language acquisition.

Tardiness Policy: Students are expected to be on time to every class. Students more than 20 minutes late will not be admitted to class. 3 instances of tardiness will also result in a drop of letter grade.

Communicating with your instructor: ALL electronic communication with the instructor must be through your COM email. Due to FERPA restrictions, faculty cannot share any information about performance in the class through other electronic means.

- This class is a highly interactive discussion-type forum. We will be using ASL every day. Note, language acquisition is developed at different paces. All students should be respectful & polite at all times. Inappropriate behavior/language will not be tolerated.
- PAY ATTENTION carefully. Follow instructions the <u>first</u> time. Your **visual attention** is imperative in ASL class. This is especially important in regard to cell phone usage. You are expected to adhere to the policy of no phone use during instructional time unless I explicitly indicate you can. Failure to follow this policy will result in disciplinary action.
- Put all trash in the TRASH CAN.
- Take care of personal business BEFORE or AFTER class (restroom, telephone calls, etc.).
- Do not bring or consume drinks, food, candy, gum, etc. in the classroom.
