<u>Course Description:</u> This course will provide an overview of human development, from conception to birth. We will explore how people change over time in small ways and large. We will learn about three major domains of human development (biosocial, cognitive and psychosocial) at each life stage (infancy, toddlerhood, preschool, school-aged, adolescence, early adulthood, middle adulthood and late adulthood). Finally, we will deal with the topic of death and how we cope with the end of life in this society.

<u>Course Requirements</u> Grades are based on points accumulated throughout the semester. A variety of means to evaluate student performance will be used throughout the course. There is the possibility of earning 1000 points from assignments and assessments. You are held accountable for completing all assignments on time. Specific details and directions for assignments must be closely followed or points will be deducted.

OPINION PAPER

Directions:

Each of the prompts below covers topics that we will discuss this semester. Critically think about these controversial issues, then formulate a thorough, 400 word minimum response for 1 of the prompts. Submit your response in D2L before the due date. There is no "right" answer, but you must give in-depth explanations and details to support your response.

- A woman knowingly used marijuana while she was pregnant for recreational use and now her child has developmental delays.
- 2. Your child has told you repeatedly that they are being bullied at school, but the school tells you that your child is the bully and other parents have complained about your child.
- Your closest, most trusted relative disciplined your child with your permission, but left a large bruise on their bottom.
- You witness your child playing with toys, but the child is acting out sexual acts that they claim they saw on TV.
- 5. A transgender woman (biologically a male) competes and wins an Olympic spot on the women's swimming team.
- 6. You just witnessed a woman physically abusing a man and he is screaming for you to get the woman off of him and to help.
- 7. Your partner has been messaging another person on social media on a regular basis, but is not hiding it from you and claims the relationship is strictly platonic.
- 8. Your aging parents need full time care, but you cannot afford to move them to a facility or hire someone to take care of them.
- The government outlaws anyone who has ever been arrested for any crime, violent or not, from owning a firearm.
- 10. The government puts a law into effect that states everyone must be vaccinated or face criminal charges.

PRESENTATION

Directions: You will create a video presentation, 3-5 minutes long, about any topic that we have covered this semester. Your presentation video should include all 3 parts as outlined below; Upload your presentation to D2L and then respond to one of your peers presentations. In your video, I MUST see your face to earn credit for the presentation.

Part 1- Introduce your topic- THOROUGHLY EXPLAIN YOUR TOPIC

- 1. Explain what your topic is about.
- 2. What textbook chapter covers your topic?
- 3. Give 3 vocabulary terms from the textbook that relates to your topic.

Part 2- Relate to current events- YOU MUST INCLUDE A LINK FOR US TO WATCH or READ

- 1. What is the video or the article link?
- 2. Explain how the video or article relates to the topic.
- 3. Explain what you want us to learn from your video or article.

Part 3- Relate to your personal experiences, opinions or beliefs

- 1. How does your selected video or article relate to social responsibility?
- 2. What is your personal experience with the topic?
- 3. What are your personal opinions and beliefs about the topic?

Example: If I wanted to discuss bullying for my presentation (you cannot use this one) my presentation would include the following:

Part 1: I would introduce bullying by defining what it is

- 1. I would thoroughly explain what bullying is and what types of bullying there are
- 2. I would discuss that bullying is covered in Chapter 6.
- 3. I would discuss the different types of aggression, maltreatment, and types of bullying.

Part 2: Share a link to a current event

- 1. I may show a video of a child being bullied, an anti-bully program, or parenting styles.
- 2. I would explain how the video relates to bullying
- 3. I would explain what you can learn from my video

Part 3: Relate to your personal experiences, opinions and beliefs

- 1. I would discuss how bullying impacts learning and connections is school which could lead to higher drop out rates
- 2. I may discuss a time in my life when I was once bullied and how that made me feel and affected me later in life.
- <u>3.</u> I would also discuss the negative effects of bullying. I would discuss that bullying is never ok and should never be encouraged

DETERMINATION OF GRADE

Methods of Evaluation/Submissions-

- Use Google Chrome or Mozilla Firefox browser (your work will submit BLANK using other browsers)
- All work must typed using Microsoft software. If you do not have Microsoft products, you can download the programs for FREE at https://www.com.edu/its/office-365.html
- All work must be saved/uploaded as a .PDF or .DOC, (especially for a MAC or I cant open it)
- All work must be submitted on D2L and attached to the assignment submission page
- Use double spacing and Arial font size 12 or Times New Roman font size 12.
- Assignments with bulleted and/or numbered items should be a separate and complete paragraph
- Each assignment has a minimum word count or page length, but you are free to write as much as you like. If you write the "minimum", you should expect to receive the minimum grade.
- Your responses must be well thought out with details, explanations, examples and exhibit critical thinking. I
 am looking for you to make a connection between the textbook material and your personal experiences and
 opinions.
- DO NOT USE the D2L app, PULSE, to work and submit assignments, the app has been known to lose files, submit incorrectly, and buffer so long assignments are submitted hours after the due date.

Grading Scale: 900-1000 points=A; 899-800 points=B, 799-700 points=C, 699-600 points=D, 599 points or less=F

<u>Grading Rubrics</u>: Rubrics for coursework can be found on D2L under MY GRADES. Click on the blue hyperlink under the assignment to review the rubric. Please read the descriptions very carefully as this will tell you how to earn full credit on each assignment.

- <u>Introduction Post 25 points</u>: You will write a discussion posting introducing yourself to your classmates. The post should read like a short autobiography. You can include any details about yourself that will allow your fellow students to "put a person to the name". Try to focus on details that make you unique.
- Opinion Paper 100 points: You will write a paper based on your personal opinion regarding issues that are prevalent in our society. The given prompts and detailed instructions are posted on D2L
- Quizzes 375 points: There will be a total of 15 quizzes worth 25 points each. The quizzes are 25 questions in form of multiple choice. You will have 45 minutes to complete the quizzes. You have 2 attempts at the quiz, however, I will only grade the LAST ATTEMPT, not the highest attempt. All quizzes are timed, taken on D2L and must be submitted BEOFRE 11:59pm on the deadline date. Once you begin the quiz, you must complete the quiz in one timed session.
- <u>Discussion Postings 400 points</u>: You will make postings on the Discussion Board and respond to your peers after you have posted. There are detailed instructions on D2L
- <u>Presentation 100 points</u>: You will record yourself giving an oral presentation about a topic discussed in the Opinion Paper. More information is posted on D2L

Make-Up & Late Work: There will be no make up work or late work accepted. All assignments are time-stamped in D2L and Email and must be submitted BEFORE 11:59. If you turn your work in at 11:59, D2L will mark it late and you will receive a zero. It has to be BEFORE 11:59. Work submitted after the due date deadline will not be graded. Please allow time for your assignments to upload. If your network server is slow, make sure you allow extra time and do not wait until the last minute to submit assignments. Follow your schedule in your syllabus and do not rely on D2L to tell you when something is due. There are computers available for students to use at COM in the library, tutoring center and computer labs if you need a computer and/or internet access.
