IRW 0320 Catalog Description: This course is a co-requisite class for English Composition 1301. This course carries institutional credit and may not be used to meet degree requirements. Placement: (1) TSI Essay—score 2 or 3 with TSI Writing multiple choice score of 340–349 or (2) TSI Reading-score of 342–350 or (3) Successful completion ("C" or better) of Read 0340 or ENGL 0330 prior to 8/31/2014 or (4) Successful completion ("C" or better of IRW 0300). This course does not transfer

Course Modality (Hybrid):

This is a hybrid course, meaning that learning takes place in person <u>and</u> online. You are expected to show up, learn, and participate in the classroom and on Brightspace each week. Because of the nature of this course being geared toward ensuring your success in ENGL 1301, your online HW will consist of working on your ENGL 1301 HW. Other outside homework for IRW will be paper-based grammar practice, reading your chosen book, and watching my quiz review videos.

Required/Recommended Materials:

There is no required text for this course. All materials related to the grammar concept packets/quizzes/etc. are created by me and will be provided to you in printed form. The only materials that you will be required to bring to class daily are the following:

- Pencil/pen
- A book of your choosing for the reading unit
 - I will show you how to access free books if preferred and will open my office library to you all as an option
- Materials from previous weeks
 - I recommend that you keep a folder specifically for IRW and a folder for ENGL 1301
- If you use a personal laptop, I highly recommend you bring and use it in class instead of the classroom computers; this can ensure that you are learning how to complete assignments on the computer you will be using at home.

Course Requirements:

Attendance: Because this course's goal is to help you be successful in ENGL 1301, your attendance and participation in this course is crucial. Participation involves attending as many classes as you can and using class time wisely to complete daily checklists and grammar concept practice. Other activities might include in-class discussions, learning activities, or conferences related to your work in ENGL 1301.

ENGL 1301/IRW Effort | Weekly

You will receive a weekly grade out of 10 points that will be based on your attendance and timeliness in both courses, your completion of the week's work, and overall participation.

Grammar Concepts (GC) / Practice Packets / Quizzes | Week 1-5

This class will introduce you to and help you review **five** different grammar concepts. You will be required to complete the packet for the learned grammar concept by the next class meeting (Ex: the GC you learn on M will have a packet due on W). These review packets will be graded as an all-or-nothing completion grade. We will go over the answers to the packet on the day it is due. You will then take a quiz on the GC on the same day the review packet is due. The purpose of the packet is to prepare you for the grammar concept quiz.

• If you are absent and miss a quiz, you will need to make it up within the week. Once I post the quiz review for that GC, you will no longer be able to make up the quiz.

Grammar Concept Teaching Presentations + Exam Question Creation | Week 6

- Though the goal is to understand all grammar concepts, you will be tasked with mastering one. As we review what we have learned, you will be required to review a grammar concept with the class. This will include recapping your assigned grammar concept, going over the answers to the final review that corresponds with your assigned grammar concept, and creating a brief class activity for the class to practice the grammar concept.
- You will also be required to create and submit 5 exam questions and answers related to your assigned GC. These questions will end up on the final exam.
- Based on the number of students registered for this class, you will likely complete this task in a group.

Grammar Concept Final Exam | T 11/25 or T 12/2

This exam will cover GC#1-5 and will include questions from the review packets and questions you and your classmates created.

Book Critique Presentation | T 12/2

Though refining your writing is important in addition to staying on top of your ENGL 1301 work, it is also helpful to think about who you are as a reader (what you enjoy reading and why). Your independent reading of a chosen book will culminate into a book presentation during the last weeks of class. More details will come toward the end of the course.

Course Grade Determination: This course is designed to ensure your success in ENGL 1301, but it is also aimed at more than just "academic" success in this classroom. The goal is to challenge you to become better at life skills that will carry into other aspects of your life, such as time management, effort, engagement, and responsibility. Your grade will be determined based on a point system with a total of 500 points possible (see below).

You may turn in your grammar practice + take the quiz on the next class day for full credit if you are absent.

Extra Credit Opportunities: There is no extra credit offered in this course except for the final review packet.

Please communicate with me if you need to miss, and I will work with you to get caught up on anything you might miss. The only ticket to leave class early is from completing each day's checklist and/or me explicitly ending class early. Otherwise, you are required to stay for the entire class.
