Course Description: Fundamental elements associated with emergency medical services to include preparatory practices, pathophysiology, medication administration, and related topics. At completion, students will describe the roles and responsibilities of advanced EMS personnel within the EMS system; apply concepts of pathophysiology and pharmacology to the assessment and management of emergency patients; administer medications; employ effective communication; interpret medical/legal issues; demonstrate ethical behaviors; and discuss well-being of the Advanced EMT.

Course requirements:

Prerequisites: EMSP 1501 and EMSP 1260.

Co-requisite: <u>EMSP 1355</u>, <u>EMSP 1356</u>, <u>EMSP 1149</u> and <u>EMSP 2168</u>. Co-enrollment is mandatory to attend the course and to receive a course completion at the end of the program. Any student not co-enrolled in any of these courses, will be dropped from the program.

Determination of Course Grade/Detailed Grading Formula:

Exams: 20% of grade

- most are noted on the class schedule; however, notice will be given at least 1 class period prior to any supplemental exams.
- Exams will cover the material of the week prior.

Final Exam: 20% of grade (cumulative)

^{*}All Students must maintain a B (80%) Overall in the course. Students that fall below the B (80%) exam average will be referred to the COM Early Alert system for academic support. Continued failure to maintain a B (80%) overall by the end of the course will result in the student not being allowed to continue one in the program.
