Required Textbook/Materials

- The textbook used in this course is *Precalculus*, by Michael Sullivan, 11th edition, published by Prentice Hall. Textbooks and/or courseware will be available through VitalSource digitally. Cost of the course materials: \$104.62, which has already been paid for with your tuition. The course materials will be available on the first day of class and you will be given the opportunity to opt-out of the e-book prior to the census day of the class. If you choose to opt out then you will not be able to submit any of your assignments, which will lead to not being successful in the class. You will receive an email with more information about the use of the course materials closer to the start of the semester. The homework and quizzes as well as the e-text and videos for this course are online at mymathlab through Brightspace.

Course Description: Precalculus is an in-depth combined study of algebra, trigonometry, and other topics for calculus readiness.

Delivery of Course: This course is a Face-to-face course, meaning that you will be attending class every **Monday and Wednesday** from 9:30 – 10:50am and **Friday** from 10-10:50am for 16 weeks. Every class lecture will have a MyLab Math assignment.

Homework Assignments on MyLab Math: There is a homework assignment for each section covered in class. These are listed on the course outline beginning on page 5 of this syllabus. Twenty percent will be deducted from the score of a homework assignment if it is not finished by it is due date. Although the homework is online at mymathlab.com, and the answers are entered online, you should write your work on paper, neatly showing all steps, and keep it in your notebook with your lecture notes for future reference. Both may serve as an aid for preparing for quizzes and exams, and as a place to begin when seeking assistance from your instructor, the math lab tutor, or from your peers. You have several attempts to answer a question correctly on the homework assignments.

Quizzes on MyLab Math: There are four quizzes which relate to the student learning outcomes. They are to be done on MyLab Math. You will need to use **Respondus Monitor/Lockdown Browser** for quizzes. If your device does not support **Respondus Monitor/Lockdown Browser** it is your responsibility to secure a compatible device. Unlike homework assignments, the quizzes must be taken in **one sitting**, they are timed, and the student only gest one attempt to answer each question. The quizzes can only be taken twice. If not taken by its due date 20% will be deducted. The higher of the two grades will be used to determine the student's quiz average on MyLab Math.

Quiz Proctoring Policy:

All Quizzes require Respondus Monitor/Lockdown Browser on MyLab Math:

- 1. Webcam required: You must have your face, workspace (desk area), and hands clearly visible always.
- 2. **Picture ID:** You will be asked to show a picture ID where your name and picture are visible.
- 3. **Environment:** You must be alone in a quiet, well-lit room. No headphones, earbuds, or notes are permitted unless specified by the instructor.
- 4. **Verification:** Prior to starting each exam, you will be asked to show a 360° view of your room and your desk.
- 5. **Live Monitoring:** Your camera must remain active during the entire exam session. Leaving the session without permission will result in a grade of zero. Covering the camera will result in a grade of zero.
- 6. **Technical Issues:** Notify the instructor immediately if technical issues occur during an exam.
- 7. **Academic Integrity:** Any violation of exam policies will be considered academic dishonesty and may result in an zero on the exam and further disciplinary action. If the camera is covered at any time throughout the assessment your grade will be 0.

Four Chapter Tests & Final Exam: There are three tests which cover the chapters in the textbook. The tests are given on the dates listed on the Course Outline. The student has one hour and twenty minutes to take each exam. There are no make-up exams unless the student notifies the instructor in writing prior to the Exam and the professor determines if it is a legitimate reason. You are only allowed to make-up one exam in the semester, given that any necessary paperwork is provided. If you are permitted to make-up the exam, there is a deadline for completing the exam, and if the deadline is not met, the score for the exam will be recorded as a zero. Exams may not be retaken. However, if the grade on the Final Exam is higher than the lowest chapter exam grade, the Final Exam will replace your lowest Exam score. If and only if you have attended class at least 38 days of our 45 class meetings. To be marked as present, you must attend the full duration of each class session: 1 hour and 20 minutes on Mondays and Wednesdays, and 50 minutes on Fridays.
