Course Description:

This course integrates more advanced preparation than IRW 0300 regarding academic reading skills and skills in writing a variety of academic assignments. Topics include critical reading and writing skills. Students will be expected to write compositions similar to those assigned in ENGL 1301. Placement: (1) TSI Essay – score of 4 with TSI Writing multiple choice of 355-362 or (2) TSI Reading – score 346-350 or (3) Successful completion ("C" or better) of READ 0340 or ENGL 0330 prior to 8/31/2014 or (4) Successful completion ("C" or better) of IRW 0300. This course does not transfer.

Course requirements:

Grading for this course will use a traditional average. Assignments include quizzes, journal prompts, and course activities. A personal reflection essay will be due at the conclusion of this course.

Determination of Course Grade/Detailed Grading Formula:

• Class Activities and participation (10%): All course activities, discussions, participation,

- *Journal and Discussion Prompts (20%)*: Reflection journals and discussion prompts will be assignment from time to time in D2L/Brightspace.
- *Content Quizzes (20%)*: Content quizzes will be given throughout the semester to gage students understanding of course content.
- *Writing Assignments (25%)*: Writing assignments will be assigned to emphasize pieces of the writing process in ENGL 1301.
- *Personal Reflection (25%)*: A reflection will be completed at the conclusion of the semester. See D2L/Brightspace for the specifics of this assignment.

*** A note on Personal Responsibility***

The personal responsibility grade will be included in the Course Activities grade category and will be assessed at the end of the semester. Students are expected to read and view all required course content materials, utilize the Course Toolbox provided in the Resources folder on D2L/Brightspace, utilize NetTutor and the COM Tutoring Center, carefully read and follow all instructions, and turn in all required assignments by the designated due date and time. Students are expected to arrive on time and be fully prepared to participate in class and in revision/editing exercises.

Final grading will be assigned based on the following scale. 100-90 = A 89-80 = B 79-70 = C 69-60 = D59 & Below = F

Late Work, Make-Up, and Extra-Credit Policy:

All assignments are due by 11:59 p.m. on the posted due date. Students are expected to be aware of the due dates and manage their projects accordingly. Assignment sheets for each major project will be provided containing the relevant due dates, assignment criteria, and the grading rubric for transparency of expectations. A grace period of three days after the due date will be provided to account for last-minute issues. A deduction of 10 percentage points will apply to each assignment submitted during this grace period. After the grace period expires, students who have not submitted the assignment will receive a grade of "0". Deadlines will only be extended for cases involving military service, religious holidays, or **documented** emergencies.

*** If you are having trouble meeting a deadline for a major assignment, it is important you talk with me immediately, do not wait until the due date. Technology issues will not be considered an acceptable reason for the submission of late work. ***

Extra Credit:

Two opportunities are provided for students to receive extra credit. (1) Five points will be added to essay assignment grades when the paper is reviewed by COM tutors or NetTutor.

COM Tutoring Center – Take a screenshot of the conformation sheet sent to you after the session concludes. Be sure to include what was discussed during the session. Upload this document when the final draft of the essay assignment is submitted.

NetTutor – Take a screenshot of your tutoring session with comments from the tutor. Upload this image when you are submitting the final draft of the assignment.

(2) Five points extra credit will be applied to the final grade for completion of the course evaluation.

Attendance Policy:

Your participation is important to the success of this course. Excessive absences (4+) will result in a failing grade. Four class tardies (or leaving early) will be counted as one absence. Remember: it is your responsibility to drop the course if you are unable to successfully complete it for any reason.

Communicating with your instructor: ALL electronic communication with the instructor must be through your COM email. Academic Dishonesty:

- All essays will be submitted to Turnitin through D2L/Brightspace–a software that checks papers for plagiarism.

Claiming someone else's words as your own (copy / pasting or turning in a borrowed or bought paper) is completely unacceptable. Students who blatantly plagiarize will receive a grade of 0 and will be referred to the Office of Student Conduct for appropriate disciplinary action.

***Usage of Artificial Intelligence (AI) *** In this course, you may not use AI for any assignment in any way, shape, or form without the consent and guidance of the professor. The use of AI will be treated as plagiarism/academic dishonesty.

Avoiding Plagiarism: Research material must be cited both in the document and on a Work Cited Page. (MLA documentation style applies to all College of the Mainland English, humanities, philosophy, or speech classes). Remember to document when:

- \checkmark Evidence is quoted directly from a source.
- \checkmark Ideas from another source are paraphrased or summarized.
- ✓ Facts (i.e. statistics) or visual material from other sources must be documented.
