Course Description: A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the Civil War/Reconstruction eras to the 2010s. Topics may include: The Gilded Age, The Progressive Era, World War I, World War II, the Cold War, Civil Rights Movement, Vietnam, the Reagan Era, and the War on Terror. Themes that may be addressed in United States History II include American settlement and diversity, American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, as well as immigration and migration.

Course requirements:

Quizzes- These will be based on vocabulary and big ideas from lectures as well as the class readings. They will contain five multiple choice vocabulary questions and one short response question based on the readings. The multiple-choice question will be worth 5 points and the short response worth 5 points for a total of 10 points possible for each quiz.

Discussion Posts- Students will write short response of at least 100 words to a question based on a secondary source reading. The students will also respond to another students post, politely and constructively, in a value-added post of at least 30 words. Each discussion posts are worth 5 points and will be graded on analysis of the source, use of lecture or reading concepts, and their value-added response. Initial posts will be due by midnight of the day assigned and the response due by midnight of the following Sunday.

Research Presentation Project- Each student will be responsible for a five-slide presentation (PowerPoint, Google Slides, Prezi, etc.) over an approved historical topic. The topic must be relevant to the scope of this course. Each slide, except the citation slide, should contain an image. You will use at least THREE primary source documents (can be images), ONE scholarly article, and ONE book. Citations will follow the Chicago style. The finished project is due April 4th. It is worth 50 points and will be graded based on clarity of writing and how well the structure and images enhance the project in addition to the above requirements. A one paragraph proposal, worth 5 points of the 50 total, is due by Feb 25th. Approvals will be given by Feb 28th. Any changes due to instructor feedback are due by Mar 4th

QEP Oral Presentation- Each student will present a 3 – 5-minute presentation of their research topic to the class. This is worth 25 points and will be graded based on clarity of the topic, use of sources and demonstrated knowledge of the topic.

Primary Source Analysis Exercise- Students will be presented with a primary source they have not seen before but is related to a concept from lectures. The student will be asked to identify key parts of the document, describe its main ideas, and how it relates to course lectures. Each exercise is worth 25 points.

Midterm/Final Exam- This course will contain two exams. Each exam will consist of a bank of ten lecture terms of which the student will choose four to write a short response to. There will also be one question from the readings requiring a short response. These responses will be graded based on the student’s ability to clearly demonstrate knowledge of the term and connect it to concepts from the course lectures and readings. Each exam is worth 100 points.
