## 1. Required Textbook/Materials

The textbook used in this course is: Finite Mathematics with Applications in the Management, Natural, and Social Sciences, Twelfth edition, by Lial, Hungerford, Holcomb and Mullins, Pearson Publishing Company.
A graphing calculator is needed for this course. A Texas Instruments TI 83 Plus or TI 84 Plus is recommended. A TI 89 or higher cannot be used in this course.
You will need access to the internet to gain access to course materials using the MML (MyMathLab) software. If you do not have your own internet access, you can get access on campus in the Innovations Computer Lab, TVB 1324, the Library and the Tutoring Center, TVB 1310.
2. Course Description

The application of common algebraic functions, including polynomial, exponential, logarithmic, and rational, to problems in business, economics, and the social sciences are addressed. The applications include mathematics of finance, including simple and compound interest and annuities; systems of linear equations; matrices; linear programming; and probability, including expected value.
3. Communicating with your instructor:

All electronic communication with the instructor must be through your COM email. Due to FERPA restrictions, faculty cannot share any information about performance in the class through other electronic means.
The email account used to register for MML must be your COM email.

## Homework Assignments

There is an assigned homework for each section to be completed online using MML. The homework for the sections that we cover during the week will be due the following Monday. However, if we cover a section on Tuesday and the exam is Thursday, that homework and review will be due before the test on Wednesday by 11:59PM.
Homework worked after the due date will receive a $20 \%$ deduction on all problems worked after the due date. You'll be able to work on past due homework until the exam date.

## Quizzes and Exams

There are 4 quizzes, 4 chapter exams and a comprehensive final exam. All of the quizzes and exams are to be done online using MML. You can retake each quiz just once to improve your score; the higher score will be the one that counts.
There are no retakes on any of the exams.
